Edward Everett Mulick, Page 16, fourth paragraph. A subsequent examination of Edward's Civil War service records indicates that his injury on the cars was the result of his head contacting a railroad bridge (he forgot to duck).

Ellen O'Brien Mulick, Page 18, second paragraph. A letter dated December 11, 1991, from Algonquin College of Applied Arts in Perth, Ontario, Canada states that Ellen was born in June, 1842. She was, therefore, 62 years of age at the time of her death. The index should be corrected under Ellen O'Brien and Ellen Mulick.

Michael Maloney, Page 9, fourth paragraph. The date of Michael's death has been confirmed through an obituary in the May 12, 1875, issue of the *Denison (Iowa) Review*. The date of Anna Maloney's birth could not, therefore, have been July, 1876, as shown in the 1900 Federal census of Pottawatomie County, Iowa.

Thomas Lawrence Mulick, Page 103, sixth paragraph. In a note from Judy Mulick Cooney dated March 4, 1992, I was informed that the correct date of Tom's death was January 22, 1986. His brother Edward (Page 106) had visited Tom in the hospital and was so upset by his appearance that he died of a heart attack shortly after returning home. The index needs to be corrected also.

George Carl Mulick, Page 80, third paragraph. There is a superfluous comma in the birth date for Patricia Mary Mulick.

Kathleen Marie Mulick, Page 99. Kathy and Karl had their marriage solemnized on February 15, 1992, in Glenwood Springs, Colorado. They have since moved to Lampe, Missouri.

James Edward Mulick, Page 97. Jim married Victoria (Vicki) Jacqueline O'Leary-Foisey on December 18, 1993, in Omaha. She needs to be added to the index with a birth date of October 6, 1961. Also, they have subsequently moved to Shell Knob, Missouri.

Martha May Mulick Sweeney, Pages 15 & 18 (Index). The date of Martha's death should be 1981 rather than 1951 as shown on Page 15. It is correct on Page 18.

Florence Lurette Mulick, Page 59. Florence died in Cheyenne, Wyoming on July 1, 1993, at age 93. She is buried next to her husband. Date of death should be

added to the index.

Irene Mary Graham Mulick, Pages 12 & 15 (Index). According to Social Security records, Irene was born in 1892 rather than in 1893.

Thomas P. Mulick, Page B3. According to Page 278 of *The Story of Sioux County* by Charles L. Dyke, 1942, Orange City, Iowa, the correct name of the company that Tom worked for was Warder Bushnell and Glessner. They were manufacturers of binders, reapers and mowers. The headquarters was in Sioux City, Iowa.

William Francis Mulick, Page 71. Bill died of prostate cancer on August 6, 1993. He was an avid sailor and left instructions that his remains were to be cremated and his ashes spread over the Pacific Ocean. The index should be amended.

Kelle Lee Mulick Silvey, Page 230. Kelle had a second daughter born on November 29, 1992. Her parents named her Kristen Elizabeth.

Charles H. "Chuck" Ryan, Page 17 (Index). Died 1993.

Lynne Marie Mulick Sandahl, Page 95. Lynne's first child was born in Soldotna, Alaska, on January 4, 1994. They named him Joseph Timothy. Her 7 lb., 9 oz. daughter, Leah Marie, was born in Soldotna on February 7, 1995. The children should be added to the index.

John Richard Mulick, Page 59. John died on December 30, 1980—not December 38.

Eileen Mulick Greisiger, Pages 65 and 66, died in Southern California on October 13, 1993, of heart trouble. Her remains were cremated and the ashes buried at sea. Eileen appears in the index under Mulick, Smith and Greisiger. This information was provided by her son, Samuel Smith, in a telephone conversation with Mary Catherine Mulick Cragin, Page 68.

Natalie Elizabeth Kizior, daughter of Patricia Mulick Kizior, Page 95, graduated from the University of Illinois in Champaign/Urbana on May 14, 1995, with a Bachelor of Science degree in psychology.

Andrew Joseph Mulick, son of George Joseph, Page 91, has completed a four year enlistment in the U.S. Army. He served two years in Europe and six months in Haiti. Andy is presently living in Edmonds, Washington, where he plans on attending college.

Timothy Donald Mulick, Page 234, married Diana Joyce Frey on December 28, 1994, in Sausalito, California. They will make their home in the St. Louis, Missouri, area.

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Margaret Loretta Mulick, Page 56. Loretta married Henry Rohling in 1920 in Old St. Mary's Church in San Francisco, California. Their three children were all born in Council Bluffs, Iowa:

Henry Francis, Jr. - April 19, 1921
Ellen Elizabeth - December 27, 1922
Robert Aloysious - October 23, 1929

Henry, Jr. died on February 7, 1969; Ellen died in January, 1963; and Robert died on October 23, 1987.

During his lifetime, Henry, Sr., was a farm investment banker in Council Bluffs.

The above information was provided by Lois "Dolly" Rohling Simpson, Robert's widow, on November 1, 1995.

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Francis Meyer Mulick, Page 57. Francis' widow, Laura Ann Bruch Mulick, died in her sleep on January 1, 1996. She was aged 105 years, 1 month and 20 days. She was buried next to her husband.

Francis William Mulick, Page 26. Add his wife, Irene Mable Strock, under both Mulick and Strock to the index as (? - 1966).

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The following information was contained in a letter dated April 21, 1996, from Diana Mulick to G.C. Mulick:

Kimberly Elizabeth Mulick Martin, Page 229. Kimberly and Buel had a son, Andrew Ryan Martin, born December 22, 1995. (Poor kid—only one present!)

Pamela Ann Mulick West, Page 226. Pamela's daughter, Karrie Lynn West, married Rob Left Hand. They have two children:

Michael - born April 13, 1991
Haleigh - born March 24, 1996

Terese Marie Mulick, daughter of Michael S. Mulick, Page 88, married Michael James Carlson on February 21, 1997, in Lisle, Illinois.

In a letter dated March 25, 1997, Mr. Bryan L. Weber states that Michael Mulick, Page B1, was a brother of Patrick Mulick, Page B8, who was Bryan's great-great grandfather. He bases this on notes taken during conversations he had with his grandfather, Edmund Mulick.

Nancy Jane Mulick, daughter of George Joseph Mulick, Page 91, married Harry Matthew (Matt) McEuen on May 10, 1997, in St. Peter Catholic Church in St. Charles, Missouri.

Patrick Mulick, Page B8, and his spinster sister Bridget arrived at the Port of New York on April 13, 1848, rather than in 1849.

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INTRODUCTION

There were 75 names and addresses of Mulicks living in the United States according to a listing in *The Mulick Family Heritage Book*, published by Beatrice Bayley, Inc., January 15, 1982. Of these, at least 25 are known to be descendants of Michael Mulick and Bridget Coleman of County Roscommon, Ireland. At least four more are descended from Edward Mulick and Julia Cox.

This is the story of those two Mulick families, the heads of which are believed to be brothers. It cannot truly be called a history because, while based mainly on fact, it also contains some family lore and some conjecture on the writer's part, particularly in the early years. For example, on Page 1 I speculate that Michael Mulick was previously married; I do not know this to be a fact, but base it on the ages of his two oldest children as found in the 1850 census of Mercer County, Kentucky, and the obituary of his wife, Bridget Coleman.

In doing research for this anthology, extensive use was made of a "Mulick Questionnaire" (see Appendix C) which was sent to approximately half of the 75 Mulick families listed in the "Heritage" book. All but a few responded.

In addition, the Co. Roscommon Heritage & Genealogy Society of Strokestown, Ireland, was engaged to research the families of Michael and Edward Mulick for the period 1800-1850. According to their report dated April 19, 1991, they consulted all available records in 19 of the 32 Catholic Parishes (the records of 13 Parishes commenced after 1850). The Society states that the Mulick name, and its derivatives, is a most uncommon name in Co. Roscommon. They were able to locate two Michael Mulick families (both in Augrim Parish) however the birth dates and other names do not coincide with what is known of the Michael Mulick of this story. The Society found only one Edward Mulick who was a sponsor at the baptism of one of the children of Michael Mulick and Susan Beirne in 1820. They were not able to locate the marriage records of either Michael and Bridget or Edward and Julia. A copy of the Society's report is included as Appendix A.

Despite this lack of irrefutable proof from Ireland as to the relationship between Michael and Edward, the circumstantial evidence that they were brothers is compelling:

1. When Edward immigrated to the United States in about 1847, he moved from New York to Mercer County, Kentucky, where Michael was living, and found employment on the toll roads where Michael also was working.

2. When Michael's son, John, was discharged from the service after the Civil War in Washington, D.C., he traveled to St. Louis, Missouri (where Edward had moved in about 1853). From there John wrote his mother that he was ill, but would return home to Independence, Iowa, as soon as he was able to travel.

3. In 1926, one of Michael's grandsons traveled to St. Louis from Omaha, Nebraska, and looked up one of Edward's sons. Another of Michael's grandsons attended the funeral of Edward's son in 1927.

4. The grandchildren of Michael and Edward became close friends, traveling between Omaha and St. Louis to visit each others' homes frequently.

5. In 1952, one of Michael's grandsons went from Omaha to St. Louis to re-marry after the death of his first wife. The witnesses to the marriage were one of Edward's granddaughters and her husband.

6. In about 1960, Edward's granddaughters invited a great-great-grandson of Michael's (the writer) and his family to their home in St. Louis for a holiday dinner. (Unfortunately, the writer failed to pursue their relationship at the time.)

This story would not have been written without the encouragement and assistance of Diana (Mrs. Don G.) Mulick of St. Louis who first interested me in learning about my ancestors. It could not have been written without the help of my aunt, Genevieve Etta Mulick, who provided many names and places, as well as most of the family lore. There are many others as well, and in particular Mrs. Gladys Corkery who did the initial research on the Mulicks of Buchanan County, Iowa. The research at the National Archives - Great Lakes Branch was much more pleasant because of the company of my daughter-in-law, Stephan Farrell

Mulick, who spent many hours at an adjoining microfilm reader researching her own family. All have my heartfelt thanks.

This is the story of the Mulick family name that could not have continued without the Coleman, O'Brien, Cox, Meagher, Meyer, Peterson, Johnson, Norman, et al, girls who married Mulick men and bore their children. Little is written of them here, not because they were not all-important in the scheme of things, but only because of a lack of research time. My apologies to them and God love them all!

The reader will please excuse the many source notes. They are included not only to enable the writer to refer back to his sources, but to permit others to check, and perhaps embellish, the research.

A word of caution is, perhaps, in order. Birth dates, unless taken from birth or baptism certificates, should be considered approximate. For example the birth date for Michael Mulick (Page 1) is based only on his age (35) as shown in the 1850 census. The birth date of his wife, Bridget Coleman (Page 4), is variously shown as:

1850 census - age 27 - (born c.1823)
1860 census - age 39 - (born c.1821)
1870 census - age 48 - (born c.1822)
1880 census - age 60 - (born c.1820)
Obituary - born 1820

In Bridget's case, this is particularly important because if she were born as late as 1823, it was unlikely she was John and Mary's mother (she would have been 14 when John was born). If, however, she was born in 1820, she would have been 17 when he was born, and she well may have been his mother.

PROLOGUE

The name Mulick, and its modern forms such as Malick, Mallick, Mullock, and Mulleague, derives from the original Gaelic name MacMioluic, a rare surname found chiefly in Counties Roscommon, Westmeath and Offaly. MacMioluic means "son of Miluc" which was a diminutive of Milo (which means "soldier"). Milo, in turn, was a Latin personal name introduced into Ireland by the Normans of France sometime between 1000 A.D. and 1400 A.D. MacMioluic was anglicized over the centuries as M'Meleke, M'Moylec and M'Mulleack, but these are now obsolete.

All of the Mulick families found while researching this anthology stemmed from Ireland except one. Some Mulicks in the United States, however, may believe they are of Polish, Bohemian, or other extractions. For example, at the time of the 1900 census there was a farmer living in Stanton County, Nebraska, by the name of James Mulick. Both he and his wife, Anna, were born in Bohemia - as were their parents. One could hardly blame James if he felt he was Bohemian, but the fact is that his surname was Irish.

This perhaps is best explained by a brochure entitled *Tracing Your Ancestors - Ireland*, published by the Irish Tourist Board. It points out that the Irish are an out-going race, blending in well in all kinds of places and situations: Peter de Lacy of Limerick reorganized the armies of Peter the Great of Russia, Count Edward Taaffe of Sligo was prime minister of Australia, Bernardo O Higgins was president of Chile, Leopolda O'Donnell was prime minister of Spain, and so on. No doubt there was an Irishman among the ancestors of the Bohemia-born James Mulick.

Note: This discussion of the Mulick family name is based mainly on Irish Names and Surnames by Rev. Patrick Woulfe, originally published in Dublin in 1923 and reprinted by the Genealogical Publishing Co., Baltimore, 1969.

MICHAEL MULICK (I)

Note: The reader will discover there were two Michael Mulicks living in the United States during the mid-1800's, both of whom were married to Bridgets. The heading of Michael Mulick (I) is merely to differentiate between the two; see Appendix B for the other Michael and Bridget Mulick.

Michael loved the green, gently rolling farmlands of his native County Roscommon in Ireland, but by the time he was twenty-five in 1840, he was finding it increasingly difficult to support his growing family. The English Tithe Law required that Irish men pay ten per cent of their earnings to the Church of Ireland whether they were members or not (and 95% were not). If nothing else Michael was a strong Roman Catholic which meant he paid tithe to two churches. Then, too, his first wife had died shortly after giving birth to little Mary who was now only a year old; their first-born, John, was three. And Michael had just remarried.

Michael had made it clear when he proposed to 19-year old Bridget Coleman that he intended to emigrate to America, and now the cart was loaded with the clothing, pots, pans, and dishes they would need in the New World. Very early the next morning they would start out on the 90-mile overland trip to Dublin.

Although excited, Michael was, none-the-less, apprehensive. He had never before been out of County Roscommon and he had never seen an ocean, let alone a ship large enough to carry his young family on a journey of some 3500 miles. He felt heavily the responsibility he bore for his new bride and his small children, and he wept at the thought of leaving his dear mother and father and his brothers and sisters, as well as the land he loved so much. Yet he had heard glowing reports from his cousin who had preceded him, so tomorrow they were off.

It took six days of hard travel to reach Dublin. Once there they soon found passage on a packet bound for Liverpool - that suited Michael just fine, for he didn't like the hustle and bustle of Dublin; he had never seen so many people in one place in his life.

Liverpool was worse! There were hucksters trying to sell their wares, beggars of every description, and emigrants pressing to book passage to ports all over the world.

At last they were off on what undoubtedly was the most frightening experience of Michael's life - the crossing of the Atlantic Ocean. Their quarters were cramped and barely adequate, but they had bought food in Liverpool which Bridget could cook on the fire built on the main deck each morning, so at least they weren't too hungry. The two children were a handful though, particularly 3-year old John who would take every opportunity to scamper off - thank God Bridget loved them dearly.

Finally the journey was over and they were in New York. Michael took an immediate dislike to the big city; it was too crowded, it was too cold, and the only lodgings they could afford were too mean. Michael was determined to move south where his farming skills would be in demand, and where he could raise his family in a better climate.

Kentucky sounded perfect to him. It was a place of small farms such as he was used to in Ireland, and he had heard of the milder winters. So Michael purchased an oxcart, packed his family and their belongings, and they were off to Kentucky.

Michael found a job on a horse farm near Lexington. There, on February 18, 1841, Bridget presented Michael with twin sons whom they named Thomas and James. Two years later, on January 11, 1843, Edward Everett made his appearance, and then, early in 1844, Ellen was born.

The next we hear of Michael is in 1850 when he is working as a "toll-gater" [*i.e.*, road builder] in Mercer County, Kentucky, along-side a goodly number of other Irish immigrants, including his brother, Edward, who had come to the United States in 1848.

But by this time Michael had determined to leave Kentucky. He could not find a decent farm to work, and the slavery issue was becoming more heated. People who were out-spoken in expressing anti-slavery viewpoints were being invited to

leave the state by county committees. Having lived under the repressive rule of the English, Michael could not stand slavery, and like all good Irishmen, he loved to talk!

Again Michael packed his growing family and their belongings into the oxcart and they moved to the free state of Indiana. Michael found work in Jennings County, and there Anna was born on September 4, 1854. Little Bridget, nick-named "Dilla", arrived in 1855. And there, in 1856, Michael died.

BRIDGET COLEMAN MULICK

[Wife of Michael Mulick (I)]

Bridget Coleman was born c.1821 and was just 19 years old when the widower, Michael Mulick (who had two small children), proposed to her. Yet on the night he asked her to marry him, she had readily agreed to emigrate to America with him (19-year old Irish girls had not yet learned how to say "no" to their betrothed!). They were married in 1839.

Bridget was 36 when Michael died in 1856, leaving her with eight children ranging in age from 17 to less than a year. She felt no desire to remain in Jennings County, Indiana, after Michael died, so Bridget and all her children except Mary (who had married the year before) joined the wagon train bound for Iowa.

By the fall of 1856, Bridget had found a farm in Buchanan County, Homer Township, about 5 miles south-southwest of Independence, Iowa. On October 9 of that year she paid \$500 for a quarter section (\$3.25/acre). *[The researcher will find the deed to be in Michael's name. The probable explanation is that women were not allowed to own real estate in their own names at that time in Iowa.]*

By 1860, Bridget was living on the farm with all of her children except Mary (John was away the day the census enumerator was there). A big-hearted, loving woman, she had taken in an 11-year old orphan from the wagon train, a lad named Thomas Conivan, and she was reasonably well off, having \$600 in real property and \$400 in personal assets.

But in 1861, financial difficulties arose due to a depressed business cycle and on January 4, 1862, Bridget was forced to use her quarter section as collateral for a loan of \$65.00. Then too, the Civil War had erupted in 1861, and James enlisted almost at once. By the fall of 1862 both John and Edward Everett had enlisted, and then Thomas was drafted in 1864, leaving Bridget, three of her daughters, and young Thomas Conivan to work the farm.

By 1870, Thomas Conivan had set out on his own. Bridget had sold the western half of the farm and had sufficiently recovered financially so as to be able to pay

off the loan. Thomas, James, and Edward Everett had survived the war and were back home working the farm. Bridget could claim assets of \$3750, while Thomas and James each claimed \$1600.

In 1876 or 1877 fire destroyed Bridget's home, and then, in December, 1878, Bridget suffered yet another grievous loss - the last of her daughters, and her baby, "Dilla", died at age 22.

In 1880 Bridget was alone at the farm with her daughter, Anna, and two of her grandchildren, Mary and Charley - Thomas, no doubt having gone off for a visit.

Bridget died on August 26, 1899, at age 79 after a lingering illness of two years. She had out-lived her husband and nine of her thirteen children. The last sentence of her obituary read, "Thus has ended a long and useful life made up largely of self-sacrifice" - doubtless a fitting epitaph. She is buried in St. John's Cemetery in Independence, Iowa.

Footnote: Bridget's obituary, referenced above, states that she had 13 children, of which 8 survived. No record has been found of the five missing children, all of whom probably were born in the ten year period between the births of Ellen in 1844, and Anna in 1854 - See Michael Mulick (I), Page 2.

JOHN MULICK
(Son of Michael Mulick)

John was the oldest child of Michael Mulick and his first wife. He was born in County Roscommon, Ireland, c.1837 but was brought to the United States in 1840 by his father and step-mother, Bridget, when he was three years old.

John was with his family in Mercer County, Kentucky, in 1850, but was not with Bridget and the other children in Homer Township, Iowa, in 1860, nor could he be found elsewhere in Buchanan County in that year.

John enlisted in Company H, 27th Regiment, Iowa Infantry as a private (as did his brother, Edward Everett) on August 15, 1862, for service during the Civil War. He gave his place of residence as Independence, Iowa, his age as 24, and his occupation as farmer. His physical description was: eyes - hazel, hair - brown, complexion - ruddy, height - 5 ft. 9-3/4 in. He was mustered in on October 3, 1862, at Dubuque, Iowa (as was Edward Everett). He was last seen by his family (again, Edward) as he boarded a steamboat for the trip down the Mississippi River to Memphis, Tennessee.

On at least one occasion, in May or June, 1863, John sent a sum of money to Bridget from Jackson, Tennessee, using the Captain of his company, Dr. Jacob M. Miller, as his courier.

He served with his company until January 27, 1864, when he was taken ill and sent to Fort Pickering Hospital in Memphis. He apparently remained there for a full year until he was transferred to the Veterans Reserve Corps (an organization of men that were unfit for active field service because of wounds or disease contracted in the line of duty, but were fit for duty in the Invalid Corps). His medical records indicate that he suffered from chronic diarrhea and dyspepsia.

John was mustered out of the V.R.C. on August 22, 1865, in Washington D.C. He traveled to St. Louis, Missouri, where he wrote to Bridget saying that he was ill and under the care of a physician, but that he was coming home as soon as he could travel. (The letter was not in his handwriting.) His family never heard

from him again, and they assumed he died. He was declared legally dead in 1915.

MARY MULICK
(Daughter of Michael Mulick)

Mary was the second child of Michael Mulick and his first wife who died shortly after Mary was born. She was born in County Roscommon in Ireland and was brought to America in 1840 when she was a year old by Michael and his new bride.

She was on the long trip from Ireland to New York to Kentucky to Indiana. There she was married to Michael Maloney by Fr. Edward Martinovic in Jennings County on November 4, 1855, when she was 16.

Michael was some 32 years older than Mary. He was a widower with five children by his first wife:

Michael, Jr.	- born c. 1845 in Ireland
Daniel	- born c. 1849 in Ireland
Sarah	- born ?
Patrick	- born March, 1853 in Indiana
Jude	- born ?

Assuming these children are listed in order by date of birth (Michael, Jr., Daniel, and Patrick are), then at least the youngest two were infants when Mary and Michael, Sr., were married.

Michael, Sr., and Mary stayed in Indiana long enough for their first child to be born:

Edward	- born c. 1857
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Then they moved to Illinois where three more children arrived:

Catherine	- born c. 1860
Andrew	- born April 10, 1861
Ellen	- born c. 1863

The growing family then moved to Crawford County, Iowa, where the rest of their children arrived:

Margaret	- born c. 1865
Mary	- born c. 1868
William	- born February, 1870
Elizabeth	- born c. 1872
Anna	- born July, 1876

Michael and Mary were in Crawford County at least by June 3, 1863, when he purchased 165 acres of farmland from one of his brothers. Before his death 12 years later, Michael had purchased some 500 acres of land in and around Denison, Iowa, and had sold about 275 acres of it. He also was a cattle dealer.

On July 8, 1874, Michael and Mary sold their 160 acre farm to a third party, and then it was bought back in Mary's name only on the same day. This was done, no doubt, to ensure Mary's financial future in view of his children by his first marriage. It also may be an indication that he was not in the best of health.

Michael died in Crawford County, Iowa, on May 6, 1875. He is buried in Denison, Iowa.

Sometime after Michael's death, Mary moved to Council Bluffs, Iowa, where her stepson, Patrick, was living and working for the Chicago & Northwestern Railroad as a fireman. On September 8, 1898, Patrick purchased a large home at 1503 Avenue C in Council Bluffs, and Mary lived there from time to time, perhaps operating a boarding house after Patrick's children left home.

Mary died on March 16, 1925. She is buried in St. Joseph's Cemetery in Council Bluffs in the Langmade family plot. (Mary's daughter, Mary, Jr., married Charles E. Langmade.)

Footnotes:

1. Much of what is related above is taken from an unsigned letter dated September 22, 1958, from one of Michael and Mary's granddaughters to Mrs.

George Pieper of Denison, Iowa. Some of the information in the letter is known to be erroneous, such as the location of Mary and Michael's marriage (it is given as Independence, Iowa). The reader also will note that either the date of Michael's death is incorrect, or Anna's birth date (taken from the 1900 census) is not correct. The letter indicates that Andrew was a child of Michael and Mary, yet he was not listed with the family in the 1870 census; in the 1900 census, an A.D. Maloney, head of the household, was living in Council Bluffs together with Anna Maloney, "servant", and Mary Maloney, "boarder". Andrew Maloney, son of Michael Maloney and Mary Mulick, died on July 2, 1936, in Omaha, Nebraska. He is buried in St. Joseph's Cemetery in Council Bluffs.

2. The researcher will note a discrepancy in the purchase of the property at 1503 Avenue C in Council Bluffs. The Warranty Deed of 1898 was issued to "M.P. Maloney". This was without doubt a mistake in copying because the 1900 census shows that Patrick Maloney owned the house at that address. Furthermore, when the house was sold for back taxes in 1945, notice of the sale was given to Patrick's children.

3. The writer has used "Maloney" as the spelling of the name of this family. Early records show it as "Malony".

4. One of the reasons the writer feels that Mary and her older brother, John, may have been their father's children by a previous marriage is Mary's age at her death. She was about 86 years old. None of Bridget Coleman Mulick's daughters lived beyond the age of 38.

THOMAS MULICK

(Son of Michael and Bridget Mulick)

Born in Lexington, Kentucky, on February 18, 1841, Thomas and his twin, James, were the first children born of Michael and Bridget Mulick.

Thomas never married and except for two brief periods, lived with his widowed mother on her farm in Buchanan County, Iowa.

He was drafted into Company B, 4th Iowa Infantry on September 30, 1864, at Dubuque, Iowa, for service during the Civil War and was discharged on May 31, 1865, in Crystal Springs, D.C. He was described as being 5 feet, 9-1/2 inches tall, with gray eyes, florid complexion, and brown hair.

The only other time he was away from home was at the time of the 1880 census - perhaps he was visiting one of his siblings.

After their mother died intestate in 1899, the farm was allocated to her six remaining children (the oldest, John, could not be found and was declared as being legally dead in 1915 to quiet the estate). Thomas purchased from the other five their shares in the farm, paying Edward Everett \$100 for his 6 1/2 acres.

Thomas died on December 15, 1910, at the age of 69 of heart disease. He is buried in St. John's Cemetery in Independence, Iowa.

The unmarried Thomas left his entire estate to his twin brother with the single stipulation that James was to have a suitable monument erected at the site of their mother's and Thomas' graves. James did so - beautifully!

When Thomas' estate was appraised for tax purposes after his death, the real property value was set at \$4000 with the notation, "This is very poor land with no improvements". The property inventoried was:

Obviously this was not a rich farm on which Bridget had eked out a livelihood for herself and her children.

JAMES MULICK

(Son of Michael and Bridget Mulick)

James and his twin brother, Thomas, were born in Lexington, Kentucky on February 18, 1841, and were the first American-born children of Michael and Bridget Mulick.

James was with his mother and the rest of her family that were still at home, on the farm just south of Independence, Iowa, when the census was taken there on June 8 and 9, 1860, but moved to Scales Mound, Illinois, shortly thereafter.

He enlisted as a private in Company D, 45th Regiment, Illinois Volunteer Infantry at Galena, Illinois, on September 9, 1861, for service during the Civil War. At age 20 he gave his occupation as farmer, and his physical description was: eyes - green, complexion - dark, hair - dark, height - 5 feet 11 inches. James rose to the rank of corporal, and he was mustered out in Louisville, Kentucky, on July 12, 1865.

After his discharge, James returned to the family farm. He married Mary Meagher (he was age 30; she, 21) in St. John's Church in Independence, Iowa, on December 14, 1871, and moved to the city of Independence where he worked as a teamster.

James and Mary had seven children, all of whom were born in Iowa, except the youngest who was born in Nebraska:

Edward Everett (II)	-born October 27, 1872
Francis William (twin)	-born August 26, 1874
Frances Winifred (twin)	-born August 26, 1874
Catherine Elizabeth	-born May 22, 1877
John J.	-born February, 1879
Nancy Laura	-born June 14, 1881
James Jr.	-born August, 1885

In May , 1882, James and Mary packed up their family and moved to Long Pine, Nebraska, where James found work as a Chicago & Northwestern Railroad watchman. James, Jr., was born there. And there Mary died in June, 1886. (There is a story in the family that Mary was killed when she and James were taking a wagon-load of grain to town when the horses bolted, over-turned the wagon, and broke her neck - she was 36 years of age.)

James made his first claim for a Civil War pension in September, 1890, while still living in Long Pine. He claimed general disability, rheumatism, indigestion, and diseases of the lungs and the heart. [By 1902, his twin brother Thomas, and three long-time acquaintances signed an affidavit stating that he had a limp and was 50% disabled. His weight was 135 pounds. (He never did receive a pension.)]

In 1891, James' daughter, Frances Winifred, married Dennis Shea. The witnesses to the marriage were James Meagher and Miss Julia Stafford. Since "Meagher" was Mary's maiden name it is likely that James Meagher was her brother, and it may be that they had moved to the Long Pine area together.

In 1892, James moved to Omaha. It is not known how many of his children accompanied him, except it was likely that Frances Winifred, John, and Nancy did not.

Then, in 1894, James left James, Jr., with James' brother, Edward Everett, and moved back to the farm south of Independence to live with his twin brother.

When Thomas died in December, 1910, James moved in with an old family friend, Steve Allen, who lived not far from the Mulick farm. On September 18, 1911, James contracted to sell the farm for the sum of \$3840.

James was in Waterloo, Iowa, at the Tremont Hotel when he died on February 2, 1912, at the age of 72 of nephritis (kidney disease). He is buried in St. John's Cemetery in Independence along-side his mother, twin brother, and baby sister, "Dilla".

James' daughter, Catherine Mulick Shrenk, was named executrix of his estate. She was to receive \$1000 with the balance, after expenses, to be shared equally among his other five living children. That amount came to \$239.76 each.

EDWARD EVERETT MULICK

(Son Of Michael and Bridget Mulick)

Edward was born in Lexington, Kentucky, on January 11, 1843. He, too, was on the long trek from Kentucky to Indiana (where his father died when Edward was 13) through Illinois to Iowa. He, too, worked the family farm with his brothers in Buchanan County until he enlisted as a private in Company H, 27th Iowa Infantry Volunteers for service during the Civil War. [*The researcher will note that he gave his address as Brandon, Iowa - a small town about 3 miles southwest of the family farm.*]

He mustered into the army on August 14, 1862, in Dubuque, Iowa. Twenty months later, on April 9, 1864, he was shot through the left thigh by a Minie-ball at the Battle of Pleasant Hill, Louisiana. (He was a color bearer who were prime targets of the enemy of both sides; the loss of the flag to show where their comrades were caused great confusion during the heat of the battle.) Edward was left in the field and captured by the Rebels when the Bluecoats retreated the next day. He was paroled on June 16, 1864, at Red River Landing, Virginia (a paroled service man during the Civil War signed a sworn statement to his captors that he would not bear arms against them until exchanged - both sides issued such paroles to avoid the necessity of feeding and guarding prisoners).

On July 1, 1864, Edward was in Adams General Hospital in Memphis, Tennessee. It hardly seems possible that his oldest brother, John, was in Fort Pickering Hospital in the same city at the same time, and neither of them knew it, but such are the fortunes of war.

Edward rejoined his Company on January 27, 1865, and then, on June 1, 1865, he was hurt on the "cars" (a then-popular expression for a railroad) between Greenville and Montgomery, Alabama, and sent to the Division Hospital in Montgomery. On June 28th he was removed to the Post Hospital in the same city.

He was mustered out with his Company at Clinton, Iowa, on August 8, 1865, and returned to his mother's farm where he stayed until 1870.

His war wound made it difficult for him to farm, so soon after the census was taken in 1870, Edward left home and entered a business school in Davenport, Iowa. There he met a young lady named Ellen Elizabeth O'Brien; he married her on May 30, 1871, in St. Anthony Church in Davenport.

The Davenport, Iowa, City Directories show that Edward was living at 511 West 11th Street in 1875. By 1877 he had moved to 525 West 11th Street, which was next door to Ellen's parent's home, and he was employed as a laborer. In 1878 he was a railroad car repairer; in 1880, a striker for the Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific Railroad; in 1881 - 1883, he was a blacksmith.

Edward and Ellen had seven natural children and an "adopted" son who was the youngest child of Edward's brother, James:

Mary Antonia	- born January 11, 1874
Ellen Frances	- born June 12, 1876
Edward Thomas	- born December 21, 1877
Francis William	- born November 22, 1879
James Joseph	- born February 27, 1882
Margaret Loretta	- born September 17, 1885
James ("adopted")	- born August, 1885

All of Edward and Ellen's natural children were born in Davenport, Iowa, despite the fact that the family had moved to Omaha, Nebraska, in 1884 (1732 South 11th Street). Ellen went back to Davenport to be with her mother for Margaret Loretta's birth.

The "adopted" James was born in Long Pine, Nebraska. It is not known whether "Little Jim" was formally adopted - there is a notation next to his name in the 1900 census saying he was adopted, but this may have been merely to distinguish him from James Joseph.

On February 24, 1889, Edward paid \$700.00 for a house at 4107 Charles Street in Omaha. The property was to remain in the family for 75 years.

At about the same time Edward went to work for the Union Pacific Railroad as a yard clerk. He was the first of four generations to work for that railroad - one still does (see John Francis Mulick, Page 85).

Ellen died in Omaha on November 26, 1904, at age 61. She is buried in Holy Sepulchre Cemetery there.

In 1910, at age 67, Edward was still employed as a car checker in the Omaha yards of the Union Pacific. Living with him in the home he owned on Charles Street were his daughters, Margaret Loretta and Mary Antonia, as well as Mary's three children.

Edward died at age 75 on June 11, 1918, of arteriosclerosis and acute embolism of the gall bladder. He is buried next to Ellen.

ELLEN MULICK

(Daughter of Michael and Bridget Mulick)

Born in Kentucky in 1844, Ellen, too, suffered the arduous trek from Mercer County to Indiana, to Illinois, to Iowa with her family. And she was there to see all four of her brothers off to the Civil War.

On November 26, 1862, at age 18, Ellen married Michael Delaney in St. John's Church in Independence, Iowa. She moved to the Delaney farm that was just a mile and a half from her mother's place.

Ellen and Michael had at least ten children, all born in Independence:

Andrew	- born June 15, 1880

According to some family correspondence the baby, Andrew, died when he was about a year old, and his mother died of tuberculosis a year later (*i.e.* 1882). There is no record of where they are buried, however Michael Delaney had purchased a plot in St. John's Cemetery and it may be assumed that they are interred there. It is known from the obituary of another daughter, Ellen, Jr., that she (the daughter) is buried there. This despite the fact that the Cemetery's records show no burials in the plot.

In about 1900, Michael sold the family farm and moved to the State of Washington - probably to, or near, Tacoma. Presumably he died there.

Note: Records of the probate of Eldridge's estate (he was not married and out-lived his parents and siblings) provided addresses for many of his relatives in 1938.

ANNA E. MULICK

(Daughter of Michael and Bridget Mulick)

Michael and Bridget were in Indiana (probably in Jennings County) when Anna was born on September 4, 1854.

Anna traveled with her mother, brothers, and sisters to Buchanan County, Iowa. She married Joseph L. Sweeney on April 25, 1876, in St. John's Church in Independence, Iowa, and bore him four children:

Mary (Kazmarek)	- born 1877, died 1927
Charles	- born January 16, 1880; died at age 5 months of whooping cough
Anna Vivian	- born May 30, 1881; died January 11, 1958
Ellen (Furman)	- born April 28, 1883 ; died Sept. 19, 1954

Anna, Mary, and Charles were with Bridget at the time of the 1880 census; it is to be noted that little Charlie must have died shortly after that.

Anna died on December 10, 1884, at age 30. She and all her children are buried in St. John's Cemetery in Independence.

BRIDGET MULICK, Jr.

(Daughter of Michael and Bridget Mulick)

The youngest of Michael and Bridget's children was born in Indiana (very probably in Jennings County) in late 1855 or early 1856, just about the time her father died.

"Dilla", as she was called, never married and died in December, 1878, at 22 years of age. She is buried in St. John's Cemetery, Independence, Iowa.

EDWARD EVERETT MULICK (II)

(Son of James and Mary Mulick)

Edward, the oldest child of James and Mary Mulick, was born in Independence, Iowa, on October 27, 1872. He was baptized on January 14, 1873, in St. John's Church where his sponsors were James' twin, Thomas, and Mary Rodney. He was named after James' younger brother.

There is no current family knowledge of this child. He was not with the family in 1880, and his name was not mentioned in his father's Civil War pension records or his will. The writer assumes, therefore, that he died in infancy.

FRANCES WINIFRED MULICK

(Daughter of James and Mary Mulick)

Winifred and her twin brother, Francis William, were born in Independence, Iowa, on August 26, 1874. She was baptized Frances Winifred, but was always referred to by her middle name.

When she was seven years old, her family moved to Long Pine, Nebraska. Winifred was 12 years old when her mother died, and there is some evidence to indicate that she, at least, went to Atkinson, Nebraska, to live with a brother, or perhaps the father, of her mother.

Winifred and Dennis Shea were in O'Neill, Nebraska, on April 4, 1891, to obtain a marriage license, and two days later they were married in the Catholic church in Atkinson. The witnesses were James Meagher ("Meagher" was her mother's maiden name) and Miss Julia Stafford.

Shortly after their marriage, Dennis and Winifred moved to Lead, South Dakota, where all six of their children were born:

Marie	- born in January, 1892
Hazel	- born in April, 1893
Earl	- born in January, 1895
Fred	- born in April, 1897
Bernice	- born in April, 1899
Harold J.	- born after 1900

Winifred and Dennis lived at 320 South Bleeker Street in Lead all their married lives. Dennis worked for the Homestake Mining Co. for over 50 years, and at the time of the 1900 census, gave his occupation as blacksmith. Living with the family at the time of the 1900 census was "Anna Mulick - Sister-in-law". "Anna" was born in Iowa in June, 1881, and must have been Winifred's sister, Nancy.

Dennis died on July 1, 1936, at age 70, while still employed by Homestake. He is buried in the Calvary Section of the South Lead Cemetery next to his oldest daughter who died when she was a senior in high school.

Apparently Winifred continued to live in Lead for a number of years until she moved to Boise, Idaho, to live with one of her married daughters. Neither Idaho nor South Dakota has a record of her death.

FRANCIS WILLIAM MULICK

(Son of James and Mary Mulick)

William and his twin sister, Frances Winifred, were born in Independence, Iowa, on August 26, 1874. He was baptized "Francis William", but was always referred to by his middle name.

William moved with his family to Long Pine, Nebraska, in 1882. He undoubtedly went with his father when James moved to Omaha in 1892, and was there working as a candy maker, when he enlisted in Troop A, U.S. Calvary, on July 1, 1898, for service during the Spanish-American War.

William was discharged from the service in New York City on May 12, 1899, and went to Council Bluffs, Iowa, where he went to work for the Chicago & Northwestern Railroad as a laborer. (He lived at 1503 Avenue C, the same address as Patrick P. Maloney who was the son of Michael Maloney, see Page 8.) He stayed there for 5 years, and then relocated to St. Joseph, Missouri, where he stayed for 2 more years. He moved to Sioux City, Iowa, for 4 years, and then to Britton, South Dakota, where he remained.

On November 9, 1914, at the age of 40, he married Irene Mable Strock in Aberdeen, South Dakota, and they had three children:

Francis Edward	- August 31, 1915
Freddie Leonard	- November 10, 1916
Florence Irene	- April 13, 1918

William worked during the later part of his life as a laborer for the city of Britton.

In 1924, William described himself as being 5 feet, 8 inches tall, 157 pounds, with brown eyes and hair, and a fair complexion. He was a laborer.

William entered the Veterans Administration Hospital in Fargo, North Dakota, on September 1, 1944, suffering from chronic hypertension, nephritis, and the residuals of a cerebral accident (stroke). He remained there until September 4,

1945, when he was sufficiently ambulatory to return home. On October 24th of the same year, he returned to the hospital, and died there on December 2nd. He is buried in the Britton, South Dakota, Cemetery.

Irene died in April, 1966, in Britton, and is buried next to her husband.

CATHERINE ELIZABETH MULICK

(Daughter of James and Mary Mulick)

Catherine, usually called "Kate" by her father, was born in Iowa on May 22, 1877, and baptized on August 10th of that same year in St. John's Church, Independence.

She moved with her family to Long Pine, Nebraska, in 1882, and may well have accompanied her father when he returned to Omaha in 1892 (she would have been only 15 years old).

In about 1905 she married Datus M. Shrenk. Five years later, in 1910, they were living at 1911 Lothrop Street in Omaha. Datus was employed as a clerk for a railroad, and they had no children.

Catherine must have been one of James' favorites - he spent the winter of 1911-12 with her in Omaha (he had returned to Iowa just three weeks before he died). She was the executrix of his estate, and she was bequeathed \$1000 with the balance to be divided between his five remaining children.

Catherine was in Chicago in 1938, but it is not known where she died and is buried. Illinois has no record of her death.

JOHN J. MULICK

(Son of James and Mary Mulick)

John was born in Iowa (probably in Independence) in February, 1879. There is little doubt that he moved with his family to Long Pine, Nebraska, in 1882 when he was three.

By the time his father decided to leave Long Pine in 1892, John may have been left there with his older sister or his uncle's family. In any case, he was in Ainsworth, Nebraska, in 1900, working as a hostler in a stable (Ainsworth is about 7 miles west of Long Pine). At age 21, he was single.

The writer knows nothing else about John. Although his sister Catherine, acting as executrix of their father's estate, was able to locate him when James died in 1912, no address was given for him.

NANCY LAURA MULICK

(Daughter of James and Mary Mulick)

Nancy was born on June 14, 1881, in Independence, Iowa, and baptized on October 15th that same year in St. John's Church as Marie Laura.

When she was a year old, her parents moved to Long Pine, Nebraska. In 1892 when her father moved to Omaha, Nancy presumably was left with her sister, Winifred, who by that time was married to Dennis Shea. In any case, Nancy was living with Winifred in 1900 in Lead, South Dakota.

Nancy married Thomas H. Goodman, Jr., in a Catholic church in Lead on October 19, 1902, and they had three children; presumably all were born in Lead where Thomas was employed by the Homestake Mines:

Clifford R. - born September 2, 1903; died May 25, 1963

Helene (Pattison)

Betty (Soloman)

Thomas and his family moved to Casper, Wyoming, in 1920 where he went to work for the Standard Oil Refinery. Thomas retired in 1938, and in 1940 he and Nancy (by this time she was called "Nanye") moved to Rapid City, South Dakota.

Thomas went back to work - this time for the Alex Johnson Hotel. He finally retired for good in 1955 when he was 71 years old.

Thomas died in Rapid City on February 10, 1971, at age 94. He is buried in the Highland Cemetery in Casper.

After Thomas died, Nancy went to live with one of her married daughters (Helene) in Hollister, California. She died there on April 24, 1976. She is buried beside her husband in Casper.

JAMES MULICK, Jr.
(Son of James and Mary Mulick)

"Little Jim" was born in August, 1885, without doubt in Long Pine, Nebraska. "Little Jim's" mother died when he was not quite a year old, and when his father moved to Omaha in 1892, the boy went along. Then, in 1894, when James, Sr. decided to move back to Iowa, "Little Jim" was left with his uncle, Edward Everett Mulick, in Omaha.

When James, Jr., reached maturity, he left for California and did not keep in touch with his family. It took his sister, Catherine, three years to locate him, inform him of his father's death, and arrange for payment of his inheritance (Catherine was her father's executrix). In May, 1915, "Little Jim" was living at No. 12 Windward Avenue, Venice, Los Angeles, California.

Footnote: In the below referenced census, the enumerator recorded "Adopted" after James, Jr.'s name, probably to distinguish him from Edward Everett's natural son of the same name; it is not known whether "Little Jim" was formally adopted.

FRANCIS EDWARD MULICK

(Son of Francis and Irene Mulick)

Francis (he was called "Bill" from the time he entered high-school) was born on August 31, 1915, in Britton, South Dakota. When he was about 24 years old, he went to work for the Civilian Conservation Corps, and then returned to Britton to find work in a bowling alley. It was there that he met Rose Angeline Vrchota. Two and a half years later, on June 17, 1942, he married her in Britton, but shortly thereafter moved to Portland, Oregon, where one of Rose's brothers lived, and all their children were born there:

When he was a child Bill got gun powder in one of his eyes, and so could not pass the military physical. He worked for 32-1/2 years for Armco Steel Company operating a riveting machine, making culverts. After he left Armco he rested for a short time, and then went to work for his two oldest boys who are in the fencing business. He stayed with them for ten years before he retired.

One of Bill's boys recalls that Bill used to enjoy sitting in front of a big-view window in the dining-room of their home. One day he refused to believe his eyes when he saw a monkey scamper by, until a neighbor came to capture his escaped pet!

Bill's hobbies were woodworking, fishing, hunting, and his children. He died on June 16, 1990, of cancer of the bladder and is buried in Gethsemane Cemetery in Portland.

Rose lives in Portland and enjoys bowling, pinochle, and handiwork.

JOHN EDWARD MULICK
(Son of Edward E. and Ellen Mulick)

John, familiarly known as "Jack", was born in Davenport, Iowa, on April 3, 1872, the first-born of his parents, but moved to Omaha, Nebraska, with them in 1884.

In his early years, Jack was a baseball catcher who sometimes doubled in brass to pitch. He was very fleet of foot and had promise as a potential professional baseball player, but he cast his lot with railroading.

Jack was one of the second generation Mulicks to work for the Union Pacific Railroad, entering service with them on June 16, 1892, as a brakeman. [*This was a highly dangerous job in those days before the use of air brakes and automatic couplers became wide-spread after 1893, and many an appendage or life was lost between the cars as the brakeman made the coupling with hook and link.*]

Jack had a fine voice and he joined the choir at St. Cecilia's Church in Omaha where he met Katherine ("Kate") Johanna Meyer who was the church organist. Kate and Jack were married in St. Cecilia's on November 27, 1895; the witnesses were Kate's sister, Ida, and Jack's brother, Edward. They had five children, all born in Omaha:

John Richard	- February 19, 1899
Joel Edward	- February 3, 1901
George Jacob	- October 19, 1903
Genevieve Etta	- June 24, 1906

Jack was a freight train conductor when he and Kate divorced on December 21, 1912.

Jack married Minnie Gertrude Baier on September 10, 1913, in Central City, Nebraska. They had one child, Eileen, who was born on January 14, 1919, in Omaha when Jack was 47 years old and Minnie, 35.

At the time of Eileen's birth, Jack was a trainmaster in Omaha, and shortly after, on December 1, 1919, he was promoted to assistant superintendent in Green River, Wyoming. In 1926, he was named superintendent of the Nebraska Division, based in Omaha (not bad for a man who had been furloughed in 1901 for neglecting to flag, which resulted in a rear end collision!).

It was in 1926 while on a trip to St. Louis, Missouri, that Jack first looked up the Edward F. Mulick family (see Page 204). Edward was a captain with the St. Louis Fire Department, and the families became close friends, visiting each others' homes frequently. It is recorded that Jack's brother, James Joseph Mulick, attended the fire captain's funeral in December, 1927, and it is likely that Jack did as well. Jack and his siblings believed they were 2nd cousins of Edward's children, and there is little doubt they were.

Jack died of a heart attack on January 17, 1938, at age 65. He is buried in Holy Sepulchre Cemetery in Omaha next to his second wife who died on April 10, 1967, in Los Angeles, California.

Jack's first wife, Katherine, never remarried. She died in Omaha on August 17, 1954, at age 82 and is buried in Calvary Cemetery in Omaha.

(Daughter of Edward E. and Ellen Mulick)

Mary, known to her family as "Tony", was born in Davenport, Iowa, on January 11, 1874.

She married Joseph P. Hawley in St. Cecilia's Church (now Cathedral) in Omaha, Nebraska, on October 29, 1895. The reader may find it interesting to know the witnesses to the wedding were Miss Ida Mae Meyer (future sister-in-law of John Edward Mulick) and Mr. E.A. Pollard (future husband of Ida Mae Meyer).

On May 29, 1903, Tony and her husband (a fireman for the Union Pacific Railroad) divorced and Tony, together with her three children, moved back in with her parents.

EDWARD THOMAS MULICK

(Son of Edward E. and Ellen Mulick)

Ed was born on December 21, 1877, in Davenport, Iowa, later moving to Omaha, Nebraska, with his parents when he was 7 years old.

In November, 1893, a month before his 16th birthday, Ed went to work for the Union Pacific Railroad as a messenger in the Superintendent's office and as a caller.

Ed went into train service as a brakeman with the Union Pacific on October 8, 1889, and was promoted to conductor on August 11, 1903. He spent a little under 5 years assigned to the General Claim Department to frustrate the efforts of unscrupulous attorneys who were taking law suits to Minnesota for trial. And he once was temporarily promoted to trainmaster in 1922 and sent to Las Vegas to replace the regular man who was tarred and feathered during a shopmen's strike. He was the conductor on the railroad's first streamliner, the M10000, on its tour of the nation in 1934. On August 6, 1935, he was named Superintendent of the Omaha Union Station, where he remained until he retired on July 31, 1945.

He married Fern Hazel Hines in about 1921. Fern was a convert to the Catholic faith and took the name Florence Ann when she was baptized (Ed was her godfather), but she was always called "Fern". Fern and Ed had a daughter they named Florence Ann who was born on February 4, 1936, in Omaha.

Ed died following a heart attack on August 23, 1947; Fern died on October 19, 1969. Both are buried in Holy Sepulchre Cemetery, Omaha.

FRANCIS WILLIAM MULICK
(Son of Edward E. and Ellen Mulick)

Frank was born on November 22, 1879, in Davenport, Iowa.

In 1900, at age 20, he was living with his parents in Omaha, Nebraska, and was working as a railroad brakeman. He was not with his family in 1910.

There is no current family knowledge that Frank ever married. He died of tuberculosis at age 38 on January 8, 1918, after six days in St. Joseph's Hospital. He is buried beside his father in Holy Sepulcher Cemetery, Omaha.

JAMES JOSEPH MULICK
(Son of Edward E. and Ellen Mulick)

As where all his brothers and sisters, Jim was born in Davenport, Iowa; the date was February 27, 1882. Perhaps it should be noted that he was baptized James Michael, but was always known as James Joseph - in fact, one of his daughters-in-law still refers to him as "J.J."

Early in his career he worked for the Union Pacific Railroad as a conductor (he was married in Rawlins, Wyoming, to the daughter of a U.P. man), but he soon joined the Missouri Pacific Railroad. He worked as a switchman, yardmaster, and general yardmaster and retired from that railroad.

Mabel Clair Clair [not a "typo" - the priest who baptized her got confused and used her surname as her baptismal (middle) name] married Jim on August 5, 1907. They produced nine children, all born in Omaha, Nebraska:

John, the oldest son, was the first child born at the then-new St. Catherine's Hospital. The doctor was late in arriving, and Mabel always believed the reason the baby died was that the hospital staff tried to delay the birth. She was told she would have no more children, but she did, and they were all born at home! (The infant is buried in Holy Sepulchre Cemetery in the same plot as his grandfather, Edward Everett Mulick.)

Mabel died at age 68 of coronary thrombosis on February 23, 1950. She is buried in Holy Sepulchre Cemetery in Omaha.

In May, 1952, Jim and Mrs. Irene Mary Graham traveled to Webster Groves, Missouri (a suburb of St. Louis), and there they were married on the 10th of that month in the Church of the Annunciation. The witnesses were Mr. and Mrs. Dan O'Donnell (Mrs. O'Donnell was the former Nellie Mulick, Jim's second cousin).

James died in Omaha in February, 1961, and was buried on the 10th of that month, and Irene died on February 2, 1968, of cancer. James, Irene, and Mabel are buried beside each other in Holy Sepulchre Cemetery in Omaha.

MARGARET LORETTA MULICK
(Daughter of Edward E. and Ellen Mulick)

Although Edward and Ellen and their family had moved from Davenport, Iowa, to Omaha, Nebraska, in 1884, Ellen returned to Davenport to be with her mother for the birth of her last child. Called Loretta all her life, Margaret was born on September 17, 1885.

She worked for the Nebraska Telephone Company for a time and then married Henry Francis Rohling sometime after 1910 (she was still single and living with her father when the census was taken that year), and they had three children:

Henry Francis, Jr.,
Ellen Beth
Robert A.

According to a fond nephew, Loretta was quite energetic, and was one of the first women in Iowa to obtain a driver's license. She was instrumental in organizing the Diocesan Council of Catholic Women and was its first elected president. In 1964, she was presented the papal award "pro Ecclesia et Pontifice" (for the Church and the Pope), in recognition of her service to the church in promoting knowledge and understanding of the church among Catholic lay women.

Henry Rohling, Sr., died on July 29, 1955, and Loretta followed him in death on July 20, 1977, at age 92. Both are buried in St. Joseph's Cemetery in Council Bluffs, Iowa.

FRANCIS MEYER MULICK

(Son of John E. and Katherine Mulick)

Born on August 24, 1896, at 3835 Parker St. in Omaha, Nebraska, in a two-story brick house built by his maternal grandfather and two of his maternal uncles, Francis was always called "Frank".

When he was young, Frank displayed a flair for the violin. His mother purchased a fine instrument for him, and he played in the Robert Cuscaden Orchestra. He was sufficiently talented that the owner of the orchestra wanted to take Frank to Europe to study under his old instructor, but Frank's mother did not want him so far away. Soon after that, money became tight and the violin had to be sold.

Frank was the oldest of his parents' children, and was sixteen when they divorced. He felt a strong responsibility to his mother and four siblings, and helped his mother support the family.

Frank went to work for Byrne Hammer & Sons in Omaha - a wholesale fabric dealer - as a salesman. There he met a billing clerk, Laura Ann Bruch, and they became close friends; so close, in fact, that when Frank joined the Navy, Laura moved in with his family.

During World War I, Frank served on the USS Mercury in the North Atlantic as a signalman. After his discharge, he and Laura, accompanied by his brother, Joel, and sister, Genevieve, traveled to Denver, Colorado, and were married on June 17, 1919, in Immaculate Conception Church with Genevieve and Joel as their witnesses.

In their early years, Laura and Frank moved around a bit - witness the birth of their children:

After they moved to Los Angeles, they stayed, and Frank first became a buyer of yard goods and bedding supplies for Jacoby's Department Store. Later he became a buyer for the Broadway Department Store. Still later, he became an importer of fine linens from the Philippines. He was one of the first to use the newly inaugurated transcontinental air-rail route to reach New York in 50 hours on his buying trips.

Frank always had a hobby. Early on it was radios - he assembled a crystal receiver set that was popular in the early 1920's . He liked to service his own automobiles. Photography also interested him and for a while he had his own darkroom.

He was well read, and could talk on almost any subject. He was particularly fond of reading the Bible. He also was fond of classical music, and he instilled in his children his love of fine music and literature.

A sense of humor was one of his fortes, and he could laugh at himself as well as the next person. He appreciated life to the fullest and he left a legacy of love of life, pride in family and country, and class.

Frank was 78 years old when he died on May 19, 1975. He is interred in Holy Cross Cemetery in Los Angeles.

His dear wife Laura, celebrated her 100th birthday on November 11, 1990, at her home in Los Angeles. One hundred and thirty family members and friends attended the celebration.

JOHN RICHARD MULICK

(Son of John E. and Katherine Mulick)

John, better known as "Jack", "Buster", or "Bus" by his family, was born on February 19, 1899, at 3835 Parker Street in Omaha, Nebraska. [He much preferred to be called by one of his nicknames - when he was in kindergarten and saying his prayers at his mother's knee one night he said, "Please God, have Miss Moore (his teacher) call me 'Buster'".]

Jack married Florence Lurette Foley on November 6, 1918, in Holy Family Church in Omaha, and they raised three children, all born in Nebraska:

Jacqueline Elaine	- born January 30, 1924, Omaha
Shirley Mae	- born October 24, 1926, North Platte

Jack was a third generation Mulick to work for the Union Pacific Railroad. He spent his years of service in the Claims Department, and was Assistant General Claim Agent when he retired. He was an expert negotiator. In Chicago in 1947 he was invited to the hotel room of an attorney representing a client with a claim against the railroad. The attorney and Jack discussed the case briefly, had a drink together, shook hands, and Jack left to go to dinner. Jack was pleased that he had been able to settle for less than he had expected to pay; the attorney, no doubt, was pleased to get more than he thought likely!

Jack died in retirement at the age of 81, on December 38, 1980, in Mesa, Arizona. He is buried in Calvary Cemetery in Omaha, Nebraska.

Florence and her daughter, Jackie, live in Mesa during the winter, and in Cheyenne, Wyoming, in the summer.

JOEL EDWARD MULICK

(Son of John E. and Katherine Mulick)

Joe, as he was called by everyone (except his mother), was born on February 3, 1901, in a rented house at 2317 South 12th Street in Omaha, Nebraska.

When he was sixteen, his parents divorced and his oldest brother in the Navy, Joe quit school, and lying about his age, went to work for the Missouri Pacific Railroad as a locomotive fireman. Firing a steam locomotive in those days was very strenuous work for a sixteen year old boy - even for one as lanky as Joe (he was 6' 4" tall). He had to fill the tender with coal and water, and then shovel the coal into the firebox with a scoop - hot and dangerous work!

Figuring there had to be a better way to make a living, Joe left the Missouri Pacific and went to work as a brakeman for the Union Pacific Railroad. Eventually he entered the ranks of management and later was named superintendent of the Nebraska Division (a position held by his father and his younger brother, George Jacob, before him). When he retired on April 1, 1966, he was supervisor in the Labor Relations Department.

Joe married LaVere Pauline Tschanner in St. Peter's Church in Omaha on December 4, 1922. Unfortunately they had no children - both doted on their nieces and nephews.

Joel died on June 14, 1978, in Omaha, and is buried in Calvary Cemetery there. LaVere died on September 26th of that same year at the age of 81, and is buried in Chadron, Nebraska - the place of her birth.

GEORGE JACOB MULICK

(Son of John E. and Katherine Mulick)

George was born in a house built by his maternal grandfather in Omaha, Nebraska, on October 19, 1903, at 3608 Charles Street.

In the early primary grades, he attended classes at whatever school his mother was teaching that year. He attended Creighton Preparatory School, a Catholic high school in Omaha run by the Jesuits, and noted for its high standards. Unable to afford college, he went to work for the Union Pacific Railroad on August 16, 1923, as a switchman in the yards in Omaha.

George met Myrtle Marie Peterson through a high school friend of his who lived just a block away from her, and they were married on January 4, 1924, in St. Peter's Church in Omaha. Waiting for the weather to improve, George and Myrtle set out on their two-week honeymoon trip on July 1, 1924. They went to Peetz, Colorado, where George had relatives. It was an exciting trip for Myrtle - she had her first ride in a Pullman car, her first meal in a diner, and her first horseback ride.

George and Myrtle produced two sons early in their marriage, both born in Omaha:

George Carl	- born November 26, 1925
Donald Edward	- born February 20, 1927

George's best friend during those years was a fellow switchman named Ernie Ruf who shared his love of fishing and hunting. They had a small cabin on the Platte River about 40 miles from Omaha, and would spend weekends there when they could.

George was promoted early and often starting in 1928 (his assignments are included as a footnote), which provided him and his family with a "broadening experience", and which brought them closer together. It also provided opportunities for George to enjoy, on occasion, his hobbies of hunting and fishing.

George so loved the out-of-doors that he presented his sons with .410 gauge Winchester single-shot shotguns for Christmas, 1938. Naturally the family got into the car the next day and drove to the country so that George could instruct the boys in the safe use of their new weapons. At the end of the session, he playfully yanked Don's brand-new stocking cap off his head and threw it in the air as a target for "Little George". Imagine the surprise of all four of them when the cap fluttered to the ground with a 3-inch hole in it. Don wanted to try it with his brother's cap, but Myrtle forbade it.

George was general superintendent of the Eastern District of the Union Pacific based in Omaha when he resigned and enlisted as a lieutenant colonel in the Headquarters Battalion, 2nd Military Railway Service, on December 10, 1943, at age 39, for service during World War II.

After training in the U.S., George departed aboard a troop ship on February 27, 1944, bound for England where he arrived on March 20th. He landed in France just a few days after D-Day (June 6, 1944), and served in France and Germany until July 19, 1945 (Germany surrendered on May 7, 1945). He had been promoted to full colonel, and had been awarded the Bronze Star for meritorious service.

George flew back to the U.S. on July 19, 1945, and was placed on inactive duty. Shortly thereafter, he was appointed superintendent in Kansas City and, later, named assistant general manager of the Northwestern District of the Union Pacific with headquarters at Portland, Oregon.

Myrtle and George's third son, John Francis, was born there on May 3, 1947.

By the winter of 1947-1948, George had left the U.P. On March 19, 1948, he signed on with the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific Railroad.

George was general manager of the Western District of the C.,R.I.&P. in El Reno, Oklahoma, when he died on December 26, 1962, at home at 705 Neal Circle of myocardial infarction at age 59 (he had his first heart attack some 7 years earlier). He is buried in Calvary Cemetery in Omaha.

Myrtle moved to Omaha shortly after her husband's death. She died there on January 25, 1991, at age 85, and is buried beside George.

Genevieve, better known as "Gen", was born at 3608 Charles Street in Omaha, Nebraska, on June 24, 1906, the youngest, and only daughter, of John and Katherine Mulick. Gen was named after her mother's youngest sister who died of scarlet fever when she was three years old. Her middle name is that of the first wife of her uncle, John H. Meyer.

Gen graduated from St. Mary's High School and Duchesne College, where she earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in Education, graduating in 1927. While in college, she played basketball for the Omaha Metropolitan Team where she was termed a "sharp-shooter". In May, 1943, Gen earned a Master of Arts degree, English Department, from Creighton University in Omaha. Her thesis, *The Aesthetics of John LaFarge as Expressed in His Paintings, Craft, and Writing*, is in the library at Catholic University in Washington, D.C.

She coached track, baseball, and basketball, and taught the elementary grades in the Omaha school system. She is an accomplished artist (including portraits - several of her portraits have been displayed in the Joslyn Art Museum in Omaha) and taught art to grade and junior high school students. At one time or another, Gen taught as a regular or substitute teacher in probably every public school in Omaha.

Gen never married. She lived with, and cared for, her mother until Katherine died in August of 1954.

Gen's only hobbies are her family and doing good deeds for her elderly friends (driving them to church, the grocery store, etc.). She is also the family historian who has contributed so much to this anthology.

GEORGE CARL MULICK

(Son of George J. and Myrtle Mulick)

Thanksgiving day (November 26) of 1925 was George's natal day at Swedish Mission Hospital in Omaha, Nebraska.

To give the reader an idea of the well-rounded education George received, he attended kindergarten at St. Margaret Mary's in Omaha; grammar schools at Minne Lusa in Omaha and St. Gregory's in Marysville, Kansas; junior high at the University of Wyoming in Laramie; high schools in Green River, Wyoming, Creighton Preparatory in Omaha (three different times), North Platte, Nebraska, and Regis in Denver, Colorado. He finally graduated from Creighton Prep. in 1943. He attended Creighton University for one term on a special war-time program that permitted seniors in their second semester to attend college classes.

George enlisted in the U.S. Navy Reserves on November 16, 1943 (the astute reader will note this was just ten days before his eighteenth birthday when he would have been subject to the draft). He was called to active duty on March 1, 1944, and sent to Peru State Teachers College in Peru, Nebraska, for a year of study until he would be old enough to begin flight training (as an aside, this was the same school that George's grandmother, Katherine Meyer Mulick, attended to obtain her degree in education).

When George finally arrived at the Naval Air Training Center in Iowa City, Iowa, on May 28, 1945, he was given the option of signing up for a four-year term or to drop out of the flight training program. Since Germany had surrendered on May 7th of that year, and there was every indication that the war with Japan would soon be ended, he chose the later, and was sent to Boot Camp at Great Lakes Naval Training Station north of Chicago, and then to Norman, Oklahoma, for aviation ordnance training. Upon completion of the required courses, George was sent to Norfolk, Virginia, where he boarded a ship bound for Panama (this was his only sea voyage, but it made him a sailor!). He spent three months working in the Education Office in Colon before being flown to St. Louis, Missouri, where he was discharged on June 1, 1946 - without having fired a shot in anger!

Before the war broke out, George had been introduced to Elizabeth Frances Norman by his cousin, Shirley Mae Mulick, who attended high school with her. Liz had other boy friends and George had a girlfriend all during the war, but George finally awoke to the fact that Liz was very pretty (she was voted the best looking girl in her senior year at Cathedral High School) and a very special young lady. He finally convinced her that she should marry him, so on April 10, 1947, she did, in Our Lady of Lourdes Church in Omaha.

But not before George had moved to La Grange, Illinois, to go to work for the Electro-Motive Division of General Motors Corporation, the world's largest builder of diesel-electric locomotives. At the time he hired on, George had thought to get a working knowledge of this then relatively new motive power, and then return to a job with the Union Pacific Railroad where he had spent some time during the war repairing freight cars and handling the U.S. mail. It was not to be - George stayed with E.M.D. for 39-1/2 years until he retired on June 1, 1986. During those years he traveled extensively for the company; he was in almost every state in the Union, and visited 14 foreign countries.

Liz and George had four children, who (as can be inferred from above) Liz pretty much had to raise by herself:

In 1962, Liz was diagnosed as having diabetes mellitus. Then after suffering from crippling rheumatoid arthritis since 1972 (she was in a wheel chair the last two years of her life), she died of bilateral pulmonary edema, the result of rheumatic fever she had when she was a child.

She passed away on September 4, 1979, at age 53, in Good Samaritan Hospital in Downers Grove, Illinois. She is buried in Sts. Peter and Paul Cemetery in Naperville, Illinois.

George resides in Lisle, Illinois, where he fitfully pursues his hobbies of wood-working and genealogy.

DONALD EDWARD MULICK

(Son of George J. and Myrtle Mulick)

Don made his entrance into the world in Omaha, Nebraska, on February 20, 1927, and enjoyed the same benefits of extensive travel and varied education as did his brother George (see page 79).

Don spent the summer of 1942 working on a ranch in western Nebraska. The day after he returned home he glanced out the dining room window and spotted a girl in shorts (great legs!) playing with some children in the yard next door. Calling his brother to the window, he pointed out his discovery and asked George if he knew her. Of course George knew her - she baby-sat the kids while their parents worked during the day. Taking George by the arm, Don dragged him next door where he was introduced to Hedwig Katherine Schmalenbach.

Don enlisted in the Navy Reserves in July, 1944. He did his Boot Camp duty at Great Lakes Naval Training Station, and then was sent to Madison, Wisconsin, for radio school. Later he struck for the Quartermaster Corps. On April 20, 1945, he sailed on the USS Marathon with 2000 troops to Okinawa, where the troops were discharged. On July 21, 1945 at 1:30 AM, the ship took one torpedo from a Japanese plane, and 22 men were killed, but the vessel was saved.

After the war was over, the vessel was assigned to carry Australian, Dutch and British prisoners of the Japanese to Okinawa on the first leg of their journey home. Later the ship, well padded with mattresses, plied northern Japanese waters looking for mines. Since only a minimum crew was carried on this mission, Don was sent to a floating hotel moored in Buckner's Bay, Okinawa, to await transportation home for survivors leave. Before he could depart, a typhoon struck creating 30 foot waves that beached the hotel, sinking 4 or 5 tugs in the process. Five thousand men died during that storm, most killed by flying Quonset huts.

After his survivors leave, Don was assigned to an oiler, the USS Kankakee, and made runs to Saudi Arabia; Tsingtao, China; and Japan. He was discharged in July or August, 1946, at St. Louis, Missouri.

After Don was discharged, he returned to Omaha. Don and his brother, George, and their girl friends, Hedy and Liz (both were telephone operators during the war), partied together. When Liz and George were married, Don was the best man; when Don and Hedy were married in St. Cecilia's Cathedral on November 20, 1947, Liz and George stood up for them. (Liz was somewhat pregnant at the time and didn't make it through the entire ceremony, but perhaps the priest, the bride and groom, and the congregation didn't think it unusual for the matron of honor and the best man to leave for a few minutes during the middle of Mass?)

Before his marriage, Don had gone to work for the Electro-Motive Division of General Motors Corporation as a mechanic's helper on the engine test floor for his brother, George. Liz and George were renting a room in La Grange, Illinois, from Mrs. Swansen, and Don was able to get a room there too, but Don and Mrs. Swansen took an instant and strong dislike to one-another, so Don and Liz determined to find other quarters - there was no such thing as renting an apartment in those days. Don and Liz did find a place that had a sitting room (used as a bedroom at night) and a kitchen (where Don slept on an Army cot) - but one had to go through the closet to reach the community bathroom. Don brought Hedy there after George went on the road and Liz went back to Omaha.

Don soon tired of the poor living arrangements; the hot, noisy work; and the rotating shifts at E.M.D., so he resigned and he and Hedy returned to Omaha where Don went into the real estate business, first as a builder, then as an appraiser.

Hedy and Don had three children, all born in Omaha:

James Edward	- born August 25, 1949
Mark Donald	- born October 26, 1951
Kathleen Marie	- born May 10, 1953

Don and Hedy were divorced in 1963; Don has not remarried.

Don lives in Omaha and is retired. He was once a pilot, but "got bored with it" not long after demolishing an aircraft with six people aboard on take-off from a grass pasture in David City, Nebraska (no-one was hurt!). His main love in life is fishing.

P.S. At 6:20 P.M., January 1, 1992, Don left Omaha to start his own journey to heaven. He had suffered from abdominal cancer for almost a year. His remains are buried in Calvary Cemetery in Omaha.

JOHN FRANCIS MULICK

(Son of George J. and Myrtle Mulick)

John's parents were in Portland, Oregon, on May 3, 1947, which is the reason John was born there. Not long after John was brought home from the hospital, his father walked into the kitchen to find John's "nanny" holding him over an unlit gas burner to put him to sleep; needless to say the ex-army colonel and tough-as-nails railroad official took a dim view of this, and the "nanny" hardly had time to grab her purse before being shown the door!

Being defenseless because of his tender age at the time, John left Portland and moved with his parents to Kansas City, Missouri, in 1948. After alternating between Kansas City and Des Moines, Iowa, several times (see George J. Mulick, page 63), John ended up in El Reno, Oklahoma, with his parents. John was 15 when his father died, and after the school term was over, he and his mother moved to Millard, Nebraska (a suburb of Omaha), into a house his brother, Don, had built for them.

Since his father was constantly on the road at the time, Mike's mother had returned to Omaha, Nebraska, to be near her mother, and Mike was born there on April 6, 1948.

Decent housing was still unobtainable in 1948, and Liz's oldest brother and his family had moved in with their mother, so Liz packed up and moved to Kansas City, Kansas, where George's father had bought a house. Some months later, Liz (who was pregnant again) found a two-bedroom, second floor apartment, and moved there with Mike.

The apartment had a built-in linen closet with drawers below and a cabinet above. By pulling out one of the drawers a little, the one-year-old Mike could climb up and get into the cabinet, close the doors, and hide from his mother. EDWARD P. MULICK

Edward had been only 14-years old when his brother, Michael, left for America in 1840. But it was now 1847, Edward was 21, and his new bride, Julia Cox, was 19, and they were eager to leave County Roscommon and follow in Michael's foot-steps.

There were the same tearful good-byes to his parents, made worse by the fact that his 7-year old cousin, James, was to make the trip with them. But it was this or starve, the blight having ruined the potato crop for two years in a row.

Edward, Julia, and James stayed in New York long enough for Julia to deliver their first child, John, who arrived in 1848. The family then moved down to Mercer County, Kentucky, to join Michael. Edward found work there as a toll-gate keeper.

In 1850, shortly after they arrived in Kentucky, Julia presented Edward with a little girl they named Mary.

When Michael left Kentucky because of his out-spoken views on slavery, Edward saw little reason to stay on. Since he was eleven years younger than Michael, he hadn't lived long enough under the repressive rule of the English to be quite as obsessed (as he felt Michael was) with slavery, and having lived through the potato famine, he had absolutely no interest in farming! Besides, he had liked the excitement of New York. So in 1853, Edward packed up his family and moved to the big city of St. Louis, Missouri, where he found work as a laborer.

It was in St. Louis that three more children were born to the couple:

Edward F.	- December 25, 1854
Thomas Francis	- May 1, 1860
Elizabeth M.	- November 16, 1867

Julia died on July 21, 1877, at age 51. She is buried in Calvary Cemetery in St. Louis. Edward preceded her in death; however the date of his death and the location of his burial have not been found.

Edward went to work for the St. Louis Fire Department as a millhand on June 16, 1885. He was promoted to lieutenant in June, 1890, and captain in November, 1901.

When the census was taken in 1900, Edward and his family were living in a rented house at 4554 Garfield Avenue in St. Louis. Living with them was Edward's widowed mother-in-law, Annie McNulty (she had immigrated in 1850), and a boarder, Clare McCarthy.

Unfortunately, Edward was diagnosed as having cancer in 1921. By July, 1926, he was no longer able to perform his duties as captain, but was kept on the rolls as a watchman.

It was in 1926 that Edward was visited by John Edward Mulick (see page 47), a grandson of Edward's uncle, Michael Mulick (see page 1). The two families became life-long friends. James Joseph Mulick, a brother of John Edward's, attended Edward's funeral when he died on December 8, 1927, just 17 days short of his 73rd birthday of carcinoma. He is buried in Calvary Cemetery in St. Louis.

Mary died on March 24, 1934. She too is buried in Calvary Cemetery.

THOMAS FRANCIS XAVIER MULICK

(Son of Edward and Julia Mulick)

Thomas was born in St. Louis, Missouri, on May 1, 1860. He was an albino.

He met and fell in love with Matilda Ingeborg Smith, the daughter of Alexander Charles Smith and Martha May Norris. Despite the fact that he was raised a Catholic, Thomas and Matilda were married in Holy Ghost Evangelical Church in St. Louis on March 1, 1883. Thomas was immediately ostracized by his family.

Earning a living as a broom-maker and as a union official, Thomas sired seven children, all born in St. Louis:

Francis Louis	-	January 27, 1887
Mabel Julia	-	July 14, 1889

At age 68 years, 7 months, and 18 days, Thomas died on December 19, 1928, of chronic bronchitis and asthma. He is buried in St. John's Protestant Cemetery in St. Louis.

Matilda moved to Miami after the death of her husband. She succumbed to a stomach obstruction at the age of 98 on February 23, 1963. She is buried in Southern Memorial Park in North Miami Beach, Florida.

Footnote: The researcher will note that Thomas was misnamed "Bernard" by the enumerator in the 1860 census. In addition, at the time of Thomas' death, Matilda gave his father's name as "J. Mulick" and his mother as "unknown".

Matilda was very distraught at the death of Thomas, and mistakenly provided the initial of his mother in place of that of his father.

Thank you for your letter of April 1st. enquiring as to the status of your ancestral research. Our apologies for the delay in processing your query but we have a constant back-log of enquiries despite our greatest efforts. Even the most straight forward research takes time. However we have now completed a search of all the parishes of Roscommon where baptismal and marriage records are extant for the period relevant to our search. Your preliminary report now follows.

R E P O R T

Parishes consulted were Athleague where records commence 1808, Athlone -1789, Aughrim/Kilmore - 1816, Roscommon - 1820, Castlerea - 1804, Ballintubber/Ballymoe -1840, Ballaghaderreen marriages 1830, baptismal - 1851 (too late for our purpose), Ballybay - 1835, Elphin 1808, Fairymount/Tibohine - 1833, Strokestown - 1830, Knockcroghery - 1841, Loughglynn - 1817, Ballygar - 1804, Ballinlough - 1830, Kilbride - 1835.

Parishes where records commence too late are Ballinameen, Ardcarne, Tulsk, Whitehall, Kilglass, Frenchpark, Moore and Taughmaconnell.

"Mulick" sometimes spelt Moolick or Mullick is a most uncommon name in County Roscommon. It appears on one entry in Boyle, one in Croghan and only in the parish of Aughrim/Kilmore does it appear with any frequency. Refer to map of Roscommon parishes enclosed. Though nothing positive was concluded from our findings in these three parishes I enclose on family charts details of two Mulick families which are worthy of note.

On family chart 1 you will find a baptismal record for Michael b. 1817 in the parish of Aughrim together with entries for his siblings and their baptismal sponsors. Having thoroughly scrutinized each and every 'Mulick' entry I discovered in the same parish though to a different family unit that "Edward Mulick" was sponsor at baptism to Susan Mulick. Once again Edward is not found too often in those times. I realize this information does not prove anything though I felt you should at least have it. It does offer possibilities, I could not locate a marriage record for either Michael Mulick and Brigid Coleman or Edward Mulick and Julia Cox. A marriage record was located for Michael Moolick to Catherine Dowd 1833.Nov.23rd. Witnesses James McCormack and Brigid Murry. No children are registered to this couple. Do you feel this might be Michael's first marriage?. I did not find many entries for Cox in this parish and could find nothing to link the two families.

I then consulted the Tithe Applotment books for Aughrim which would cover the time period we are concerned with 1820's-1840. Michael Mulick appears in the townland of Bryan More (see map of Aughrim), Carrowreagh with James Mulick and Kilcroy. Pat Mulick appears in the townland of Loughboy. As you can see, they all lived in close proximity to one another.

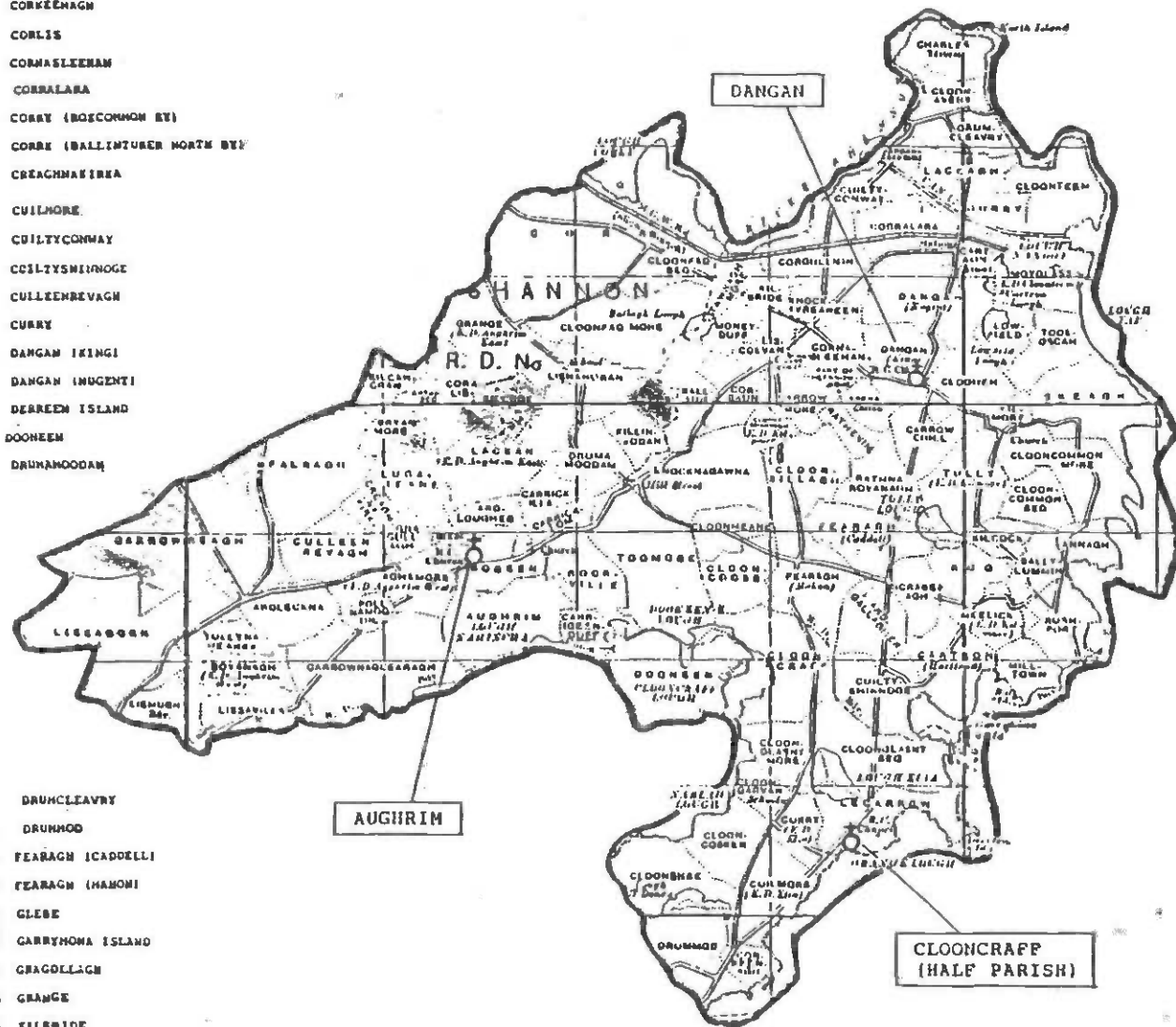

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APPENDIX B

SOME OTHER MULICK FAMILIES

While researching the two Mulick families that were in Mercer County, Kentucky, in 1850 (Michael and Bridget Coleman Mulick, and Edward and Julia Cox Mulick), a number of other Mulick families came to the attention of the writer, either through correspondence or census searches. Some of these families may have been related to the aforementioned Michael and Edward (brothers or cousins), but based on the report of the County Roscommon Heritage & Genealogy Society (see Appendix A), it is unlikely that this will ever be proven. We can only assume, therefore, that all of the Mulicks with roots in County Roscommon are related in one way or another - just as we all descend from Adam and Eve.

MICHAEL AND BRIDGET CALLAGHAN MULICK

Michael and Bridget were both born in County Roscommon, Ireland, he on September 8, 1820, and she on June 15, 1822. Bridget's maiden name was Callaghan.

Michael and Bridget probably immigrated in about 1851; they were in New York when their oldest child, Michael C., was born c. 1853.

The family then moved to Wisconsin when the rest of their children arrived:

Mary A.	- c. 1856
Thomas P.	- c. 1858
Margaret	- c. 1862
Edward J.	- July 5, 1864

Michael and Bridget moved to Howard County, Iowa, and preempted land 1- 1/2 miles northeast of Riceville. He purchased a quarter-section on July 3, 1867.

Michael died on November 22, 1902; Bridget followed him on December 22, 1906. Both are buried in Calvary Cemetery in Riceville.

MICHAEL C. MULICK

(Son of Michael and Bridget Callaghan Mulick)

Michael married yet another Bridget (nee Carey) in about 1875, and they produced more little Mulicks, all of whom were born in Iowa:

They may have had several more since Michael was only 27, and Bridget but 25 in 1880.

It is probable that Michael was working the farm his father had purchased in 1867; he was a farmer, and his brother, Thomas, was also a farmer living with Michael in 1880.

THOMAS P. MULICK

(Son of Michael and Bridget Callaghan Mulick)

Thomas and his wife, Ellen Bohan, were living in Riceville, Iowa, when their children were born:

Daniel	- September 28, 1883
Edward	- March 12, 1885
Mary	- November 20, 1886
Cletus	- June 3, 1888
Genevieve	- July 17, 1889

In 1901 Thomas and his oldest son, at least, were in Council Bluffs, Iowa. Thomas was manager of Wonder, Bushnell & Gleason Co., and Daniel was a traveling repairman for the same company.

He moved his family to Minot, North Dakota, in 1903 and opened the Minot Branch of International Harvester Co. Except for three years when he was I-H manager in Fargo, he remained in Minot. He is, no doubt, buried there.

CLETUS MULICK

(Son of Thomas P. and Ellen Mulick)

Cletus served in World War I as a second lieutenant in the U.S. Army with the motorized field artillery. In 1928, he married Merle Fenton in Los Angeles, California. They were living in California at the time of her death in 1964.

After the war, Cletus worked for the Studebaker Corporation for 45 years, serving in Minneapolis, Minn.; Albany, N.Y.; Omaha, Nebr.; and as regional manager in Portland, Ore.; San Francisco, Calif.; and in Los Angeles.

Cletus died on January 27, 1974, in Minot. Having no children, he left a substantial trust in excess of \$400,000 to Ryan (Catholic) High School in Minot.

EDWARD J. MULICK

(Son of Michael and Bridget Callaghan Mulick)

Edward was born on July 5, 1864, in Watertown, Wisconsin, and moved with his family to Riceville, Iowa, when he was 2 years old.

By the time he was 19, Edward was an apprentice lawyer, and he later rose to prominence as an attorney. He represented both the Great Northern and the Northern Pacific Railroads when the lines were being developed in the West. He also was the campaign manager for William Jennings Bryan and the elder La Follette during their presidential campaigns.

Edward married Margaret M. Guyette (probably in Omaha, Nebraska, - he lived in Council Bluffs, Iowa, for a time), and they had a son, Edward Claude, who was born in Omaha on April 15, 1911. By this time Edward J. had been forced to give up his law practice due to ill-health, and had leased a ranch near Perma, Montana.

Edward died on September 6, 1941, in Missoula, Montana; he is buried in Plaines.

EDWARD CLAUDE MULICK

(Son of Edward J. and Margaret Mulick)

This Edward was born in Omaha, Nebraska, on April 15, 1911. He was a self-employed merchant, and married Neta Isabell McFadden. The couple had two children, both born in Missoula, Montana:

Edward James - June 2, 1938

Edward C. died on December 17, 1987, and is buried in Plaines, Montana.

Joan married Anthony L. Peressini, and now lives in Champaign, Illinois, where her husband is a university professor. Joan and Anthony have five children.

Edward James is a graduate of Creighton University of Dentistry in Omaha and is a practicing orthodontist in Boise, Idaho. He and his wife, Jeanne Mae Christison, had six children, one of which died in infancy.

PATRICK MULICK

Patrick was born in County Roscommon, Ireland, on January 1, 1834. When he was 13, Patrick, together with his 15-year old sister, Bridget, arrived at the Port of New York on April 13, 1849, aboard the ship Eliza-Caroline out of Liverpool.

Patrick married Mary McCormack in Port Jervis, New York, on October 24, 1854 (it was the County Roscommon-born Mary's 24th birthday).

Mary and Patrick moved to Sun Prairie, Wisconsin, where six of their children were born:

John Francis	- August 3, 1855
Mary (Sister Seratina)	- April 4, 1857

Honora (Sister Mark) - January 31, 1859
Anna - May 2, 1861
Bridget (Sister M. Lenontine) - January 10, 1863

The family then moved to a farm near Riceville, Iowa, where two more children were born:

James W. (M.D.) - February 4, 1867
Joseph (D.V.M.) - July 21, 1869

Mary succumbed on August 6, 1903, and Patrick died on November 8, 1914. Both are buried in Calvary Cemetery in Riceville.

Edward and Margaret Mulick were both born in Wisconsin; he in September, 1840, and she in April, 1845. All four of their parents were born in Ireland. As with most of the Mulicks of that era, Edward was a farmer.

James was born in January, 1865; Anna in May, 1866. Both they and their parents were born in Bohemia (see Prologue). James immigrated in 1868; Anna in 1880. They married in about 1884, and had the following children:

E. AND J. MULICK

Unfortunately the enumerator in Scott County, Kentucky, used initials only when the census was taken in 1850.

The 28-year old E. (male) was born in Ireland, and listed his occupation as laborer. His wife (it may be assumed), J., was age 27, and was also born in Ireland.

The couple had a son, J., who was born in New York in about 1848 which leads the writer to believe they probably immigrated shortly before then. They also had a daughter, M.A., who was born in Kentucky in February or March of 1850.

Living in the same dwelling in 1850 was a male laborer, J. Mulick, age 22, as well as a 34-year old laborer, A. Mullery, and (the writer assumes) his son, 4-year old J. Mullery.

In conclusion, the writer cannot help but comment on the similarities between some of these early Mulick families. Edward and Margaret Mulick were born in Wisconsin, and lived in Jefferson County. Michael and Bridget Callaghan Mulick lived in Wisconsin before moving to Riceville, Iowa - at least one of their children (Edward J.) was born Watertown which is about 20 miles east of Sun Prairie.

Patrick and Mary McCormack Mulick lived in Sun Prairie, Wisconsin, which is in Jefferson County, before moving to Riceville. According to the death records of Buchanan County, Iowa (Book 6, Page 312), Patrick M. Mulick, the son of Patrick and Mary McCormack Mulick, died on his farm in Washington Township on December 7, 1932 - his farm was less than 20 miles from that of Bridget Coleman Mulick. One can only assume that these families had some close connection.
