# WERE THERE REALLY THREE MOCK BROTHERS WHO IMMIGRATED IN 1752?

Some have questioned, with good reason, the three-brother theory that Peter, John and Alexander Mock, from Wurtemberg, Germany, all immigrated together on the Ship St. Andrew from Rotterdam to Philadelphia, 23 Sept. 1752. When one looks at the passenger list from the St. Andrew for that date, from Henke and Strausberg, we find a Peiter Mack listed with Johannes Mack, but no Alexander.

There are a number of questions that come to mind such as, could Alexander have been aboard but below the age that passengers were listed? Sure, this is a possibility, but what evidence do we have to back this up? Did this Peter Mock really immigrate, or could be have been descended from a pre-existing Mock/Mauck family?

This three-brother theory seems to be a tradition that may have been passed down by researchers for many years. One of the earliest ones to subscribe to it was M.S. Kincheloe who wrote the paper 8 Aug 1937, The Family of Henry Mook, Jr (1794-1892) in Virginia, that stated "The Family of Henry Mook, Jr is German. The early Mooks came to Pennsylvania from Wurtemberg, Central Germany, about 1752. Three brothers can be definitely designated in the migration: Alexander, John and Peter." Unfortunately he did not supply evidence to back up this statement, so we don't know if it was based on fact or tradtion.

Another early researcher, Mrs. Bessie Stretcher Gray, who compiled the book Partial Genealogy of the Stretcher and Mock Families in America, subscribed to the three-brother theory and believed that they all came together in 1752 on the ship St. Andrew. Her ancestor was Peter, who went to North Carolina, where he was located in Rowan County by 1786 and was stated to have had a land grant there of 200 acres. This land record is confirmed.

According to Mrs. Gray, the three brothers are mentioned in a land grant in North Carolina in about 1784. She gives almost no documentation of any of her work, and this statement seems to be no exception. If one could prove that Alexander and John lived in North Carolina at an early date, it might give some weight to the theory of the three brothers. So far, I am not aware of any evidence to substantiate this.

Mrs. Gray also gives the date of birth of her Peter Mock as 1742, which if true, and again there is no documentation, would seem to exclude him from being the Peter mentioned in the passenger list aboard the 1752 ship since he normally would have been too young to be listed as a passenger.

Only little primary searching has so far been done by me in North Carolina and most of what has been learned has been gleaned from the research of others. It is possible that some of our readers have already studied this problem and can give us a more definitive answer. Unless we can resolve this issue, it would seem better not to refer to this Peter as one of the "three brothers," but perhaps as the early Peter Mock in North Carolina.

It is very likely that this Peter Mock was in North Carolina some years prior to the deeds that so far have been located. According to the Mock Family Historian Vol. 1, No. 6 November 1992, p. 55, from an article reprinted from the Rowan County Register, Nov. 1989, a Peter Miller family bible was located which gives the birth of Mary Ann Margaret Mock and notes that she was a daughter of Peter and Barbara (Martin) Mock, as occurring in Randolph County, NC 24 Aug 1767 on Sandy Creek. Although this would be considered as a secondary source, Peter Miller was a son of Henry and Mary Ann Margaret Miller. It is also of interest that this Henry Miller was a son of Casper Miller and wife Margaretha who were living in Frederick Co., VA when Henry was born

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If the John Mack Mock who died in Reading, Berks County, PA, in 1793 is the John Mack who was aboard the ship St. Andrew in 1752, I am not aware of any evidence that he was ever in North Carolina, as claimed by some of the early researchers. There is, however, evidence that several of his children were there.

The only evidence that I know that these people were from Wurtemberg, Germany was in the will of John Mack/Mock's second wife, **Judith Webber Ripple**, which gave her origin there. Again, I would certainly like to hear from others who may have more knowledge on this issue.

To complicate matters, some who have researched the **Peter Mock** who moved from Maryland to Bedford County, PA, believe he immigrated in 1752 from Wurtemberg, Germany and one wonders if they may be claiming the same Peter.

One method used to determine if a person listed as a passenger on a ship may be the same as a person living in a given locality is to study the other passengers and find out if any of them settled in the same area. Many of these people, if they were not associated in the old world, became close friends with those who endured the same hardships aboard ship and often migrated together. Others were closely associated in the foreign country of origin and many were related. This certainly needs to be done to see which Peter immigrated in 1752.

Several are now searching for possible relationships between the various early Mocks in Pennsylvania, Virginia, Maryland, North Carolina, Tennessee, Georgia and other states. Steve Lapp has made an outstanding contribution in a separate article in this issue showing that the early **Andrew Mock**who was married to **Elizabeth** and who was a member of the NC Heidelberg Church, originated in Virginia and was not a son of Peter and Barbara Martin as previously presumed, but a son of **Peter and Juliana Mauck**.

Correspondence is invited from others who may be researching any of these lines or who may have additional evidence.

# ANDREW MOCK AND MOCKSVILLE, NORTH CAROLINA

From the book Davie County (NC) by James W. Wall in 1976, page 98:

"Mocksville may have been a village at the time of the Revolutionary War. First called Mocks Old Field, it is believed to have been named for **Andrew Mock**, who evidently owned part of the land on which the town was built. Rowan (County) deed records identify the village by this name, and the Mocks Old Field Post Office was established in 1810. Some facts about the town prior to the formation of Davie County in 1836 are known from deeds, tax lists, wills, voter registrations and Rowan court records, but these are sparse and for the most part unrelated."

... In 1899 the local paper began a description of Mocksville: "One of the healthiest towns in western North Carolina -- a quiet town situated on the North Carolina Midland Railroad 27 miles from Winston-Salem and 50 miles from Charlotte -- Population 700."

Andrew Mauck settled in North Carolina for a short time after the revolutionary war before moving on to Tennessee around 1800. He was the son of Peter Mauck from the Shenandoah Valley. Now - after brief review of my Andrew Mauk article *Mock Family Historian*, Vol. II, #3, Summer 1993, page 35, I find JoWhite Linn's Rowan County, NC Deed Abstract as follows:

Dec. 30, 1785 transfer of 250 acres on Bear Creek from Gasper Sein to Andrew Mock for 50 £

Bear Creek runs right past Mocksville, NC and Heidelberg Church was one of the first in Mocksville and vicinity. **Andreas and Elizabeth Mock** baptised at least three children there in the early 1790's. In addition to the two daughters identified in my *Summer 1993 MFH* article, there is also a baptismal record from Heidelberg Church for a son:

"Johannes MACK born June 29, 1793, bapt. Sept. 15 1793
Parents and sponsors: Andreas Mack and wife Elizabeth "

This Andreas and Elizabeth are definitely the MOCKS who moved to Tennessee and are related to Peter of Shenandoah Valley. SO - it appears that MOCKSVILLE, North Carolina is named after this Andrew Mauk / Mock, son of Peter and brother of Henry.

In response to my inquiry to Doris B. Frye, History Room Librarian at Davie County Public Library, 371 North Main Street, Mocksville, NC 27028, I received the following: Sain Family History, by Charles H. Sain, as presented at Laurel Hill Methodist Church, Sept. 12, 1976 (Only cover, introduction and page three were sent.) Quoted from page three: "Casper Sain married Rosanna Mocke. He was born in 1730's in the Palantinate and died between 1810 and 1820. Lived in Pennsylvania and Rowan County, NC. They had nine children (listed)." (The first child, John, was "born about 1760, married Elizabeth Huff.")

On Jan. 26, 1994, I spoke with Mr. Charles Sain by phone at his home in Birmingham, AL. He does not have documentation on hand to confirm that **Rosanna Mock** was indeed the wife of Casper Sain, but he believes that information is available at the Davie County Library. He did state that Casper Sain arrived in America aboard the ship *Dragon* on Sept. 26, 1749. We can only speculate as to what relationship this **Rosanna Mocke** is to **Andrew Mock**.

Barbara, I was so pleased to receive the info from you. There's no doubt in my mind but that the missing female in your family chart [Peter & Barbara Martin Mack] is Mary Ann Margaret Mauk (Mock) who is the ancestor of my husband, Lloyd Willis (Bud) Miller. The enclosed information has been collected for some years by various members of the family. Charles Miller of Waynesville shared his information with me and we agreed on most of the points, having received bits of news from many directions. Please continue to share with me any additional items. There were Mocks in Rowan Co. before our records begin - Help with that, too! ... We never knew before the connections between all the Rowan Co. Mocks. Note that our records show that Mary Ann Margaret Mauk was bornin Randolph Co. (old Rowan) NC in 1767. Your family chart notes that Peter and Barbara were in Rowan Co. 1784-86. These dates may be dues as to the Peter in Va.?? Henry Miller and Mary Ann Margaret were married in Rowan 1794. It's great to find new relatives. Hope the endosed does help you.

"The Miller, Mauk (Mock, Mack) and Moose (Mussgenug) families came from the Netherlands together. Henry Miller, son of Gasper (Gaspar, Casper, Jasper) and Christian (Christiana, Christenah) Miller, was born in Frederick County near New Town in New Virginia on the 15 Jun 1767.

Mary Ann Margaret Mauk, daughter of Peter and Barbara Mauk, was born on Sandy Creek, Randolph County, North Carolina State 24 Aug 1767. The same age as her husband wanting about two months.

The aforesaid Henry Miller and Mary Ann Margaret Mauk were married by Edward Harbin, Esq. eight miles from the Shallow Ford of the Yadkin River, Rowan Co. (now Davie Co.) NC 9 Nov 1794. Henry and Mary Ann Margaret later lived at his sawmill place on Elk Shoal near Catawba River, Iredell Co. (now Alexander Co.), having had 8 children. [The following children b. near said Shallow Ford, Rowan Co.]: (1) Julian Miller b. 2 Aug 1795. Records of Heidelberg Lutheran (Old Dutchmans Creek) Church, Rowan Co., lists Juliana Miller born August 2, 1795, baptized Nov. 8. Parents: Hinrich (Henry) Miller and wife Margaretha. Sponsors: Peter Mack and wife, Barbara. (2) Elizabeth Miller, b. 24 Mar 1797, d. 10 Aug 1798; (3) Sally Miller b. 26 Mar 1799.

The following children were born on Elk Shoal near Catawba River, Iredell Co.: Peter Miller b. 4 Dec 1801, d. 8 Mar 1881; John George Miller b. 8 Jan 1804; Henry Miller, Jr. b. 23 May 1806; Mary Polly Miller, b. 10 May 1808; Jacob Ambrose Miller b. 10 Jun 1810.

Mary Ann Mauk Miller, wife of Henry Miller, died on Saturday, June 4, 1814 after about three months of severe illness and was buried on June 5th on Sunday afternoon and, according to her request, was buried in a field on their own plantation. (Now Alexander Co., NC)

The preceeding information came from the Bible of Peter Miller (son of Henry and Mary Ann Mauk Miller).

All of the film drawers opened and everything flew out. Many of our Mock members sustained damage to their homes, but thankfully, no injuries. Both Helene & I are working on this line, trying to connect them with our George Mack / Mock family who went from PA to Fairfield Co., OH after 1820.

Family Reunion - In October the family of Julius Edgar Mock & Josephine Stark Mock had a reunion in Hutchinson, Kansas. There were about 45 relatives there. My mother, Edith Mock Amerine is the last survivor of 10 children. Three of her sisters-in-law are still living. I took all the [MFH] Historians for them to see, as well as the Smithsonian, Oct. issue which featured the Delany sisters--that contained their comment quoting their father who was a slave, that he was owned by a family named Mock, and was treated very well. # WILLIAM MAUK of MUSKINGUM CO., OHIO

William Mauk (1827-1873), my great-great grandfather, of Newton Twp., Muskingum Co. OH was a son of Anthony Mauk of Frederick Mauk. These Frederick Co. Mauks have been discussed by J.P. Mauk, Ron Moore and others in this publication and the Prodigy BB. William Mauk's bible is interesting because it identified and gave data on his parents in addition to the data on his family and later generations. William and his wife Martha Shields died of tuberculosis before the children were grown and most of the children were raised by others, thus there was not a complete set of data on the children in the bible. The bible was in the possession of my great aunt, May Mauk (wife of Rufus Moody) and she apparently added the more recent data. Upon her death the bible came into the possession of my grandmother, Elsie Mauk (wife of Clyde Fauley) and I received the bible from her.

The bible was published by J.A. & U.P. James, 1852. The data is reported below as it appears in the bible.

# SHENANDOAH VALLEY CONNECTIONS

Daniel EBERLY married Catharine CRABILL. Daniel's parents are Jeremiah EBERLY and Christina BAKER. Catharine's parents are Christian CRABILL and Barbara Mauck. Barbara Mauck was born in 1765 to John Mauck and Ann Delilah ZUMWALT and is the grand-daughter of Peter Mauck of Frederick Co., VA.

Now we know that Christina BAKER died before 1802 (from her father's will), and Jeremiah EBERLY/EVERLY remarried soon after to Catharine Mock. Catharine Mock was born in 1762 to George and Sophia Muller Mock in Lancaster Co., PA She moved with her family to the Shenandoah Valley in the late 1770's.

So we have Daniel EBERLY living with his stepmother Catherine Mock at about the time he married the great-granddaughter of Peter Mauck. All this is to show that there are some family connections between the descendants of Peter Mauck and those of George Mock.

The following is from Shenandoah Co., VA Will Book P - page 99 (as abstracted by Amelia C. Gilreath and published in 1980): "Christian CRABILL, Shenandoah County. Wife: Barbara Crabill. Sons: William Crabill and David Crabill - plantation whereon I now live. Son: John Crabill. Daus: Rebecca Strider, widow of Daniel Stricler, Catharine, wife of Daniel Eberly; Susannah, wife of Samuel Kerns. Mentions: Joseph and Noah Roads, children of my Mary (dec'd). Exors: Sons, David Crabill, William Crabill and John Crabill.

Wit: Christian Hockman and George Hockman

Dated: 20 Feb 1829

#### CHRISTMAS GRINNING AT MY OLD KENTUCKY RIFLES

Santa has brought two percussion cap Kentucky long rifles. They put meat on many Christmas tables! The first, 63 inches long, was made by "R. Mock". The second, 55 inches long, was made by "G. Mock".

"R" and "G. actual identities are uncertain. Some eight Mock's were gunsmiths in early Kentucky. The **Mauck's** came from the Palatine (Germany) or Switzerland to Pennsylvania and Virginia in the 1700's and hence to North Carolina and Kentucky.

### Likely Relatives

Guns are not the only Mock Kentucky connection to Christmas, you know. There were Mock's in early Bourbon County. They worked very hard. Consider the rifles with scotch and soda. Are "R" and "G." my forefathers, some 150 years or so back?

Daniel (1760? - 1825), the son of Rudolph Mauck of VA, is the first known gunsmith in my direct line. He is my great, great - grandfather, an incorporater of Springfield, KY and a militia general in 1812 who likely changed Mauck to Mock. Daniel died in Perry County, IN, survived by two girls and three boys, one being Reuben. Reuben (1790 - 1876), my great, great - grandfather, a gunsmith, was the father of thirteen children; one was George S. (1824 - 1900), my great grandfather, a photographer. Another son was Reuben (1841 - ?).

Possibly the gunsmith for the 63" long .50 caliber rifle with set trigger was the first Reuben. Its full stock, seemingly from the 63 inch piece of walnut, hefts 10 pounds.

The smith of the 55" .40 caliber rifle stamped "G. Mock", also weighing 10 pounds, with set trigger is more uncertain. The full stock, 55 inches of striped curly maple, is possibly by my g. grandfather, George S., the photographer and mattress maker of Lebanon. I don't think so. His nephew, George (1843 - 1933), son of a Daniel J. Mock (1813 - 1879) is more likely. Or a George more distant to me. I have a muzzle loading pistol made by George S. His workmanship does not equal that of the 55" rifle. (I'm sorry, George. George, I'm sorry! Note my own pitiful handyman attempts).

The hayday of Kentucky or Pennsylvania rifles was between 1750 and 1860 when cartridge, repeater and mass-assembled arms took over. It was a memorable moment for my father (1878-1950) to see his father, George A. (1850 - 1913), regroove a gun barrel with a rifling machine. Assuredly, by 1893 when my father left home, Mock gunsmithing days were over.
