MICHAEL MOCK, SON OF THOMAS MOCK of Effingham Co., GA

My great-grandfather, Michael Mock II (1841-1921) was of pure German ancestry. I have several pictures of him, one as a smooth-faced newlywed and others showing him with beard, in an old-fashioned black hat and clothes. In the latter pictures he looks very much like an Amish or Mennonite farmer, but he was neither. Michael was descended from Lutherans who came to America in the mid 18th century from Swabia, Wurttemberg, in SW Germany, and from their children who passed through southwest Ohio before arriving as early settlers around Oaklandon, Indiana. His mother's family were Pennsylvania Dutch (that is, Germanspeaking settlers in PA), but his father's family came from Georgia and North Carolina.

The original Mock emigrant to America was eighteen year old Thomas Mock (or Mackh, 1733-1807), who arrived in December 1751. He came from Swabia in Wurttemberg, Germany by way of London on the ship Antelope to settle near the Savannah River in Effingham Co., GA. I learned about this Thomas Mock from a short genealogical monograph by Carol and H.A. Scott titled Michael Winecoff: The early Years in America,. That Michael Winecoff became Thomas Mock's (1) father-in-law and may also have been his uncle or cousin by marriage.

According to the Scott monograph, a group of 157 Swabian Wurttembergers, including Michael Winekauf and Thomas Mackh, sailed to America in the late summer of 1751, landed in Oct 1751 and later settled 25 miles up the Savannah River. Almost 20 years earlier, a community of other German Lutherans from Salzburg had already settled there in the community of Ebenezer, around the Jerusalem Evangelical Lutheran Church. The Swabians formed the Bethany Colony of Georgia.

The British motive in settling German families in Georgia was to create a kind of buffer zone of German settlers between the Spanish-held lands in Florida and the English settlers in Virginia and the Carolinas.

The group of Swabians was led by William Gerard de Brahms, a military engineer, map maker, surveyor and convert from Catholicism to Protestantism. As a convert, he faced employment problems with the Catholic authorities in Swabia at that time and it is thought that is the reason he organized the group of Lutheran emigrants. Michael Winekauf was one of the seven "elders" of the group of "fifty four men, forty six women, twenty seven boys and thirty girls." On August 12, 1751 the elders met with the trustees of the Georgia Colony in London seeking to join a group of protestants from Salzburg that had already settled there. The Trustees agreed, and as was standard practice, promised to give 50 acres of Georgia land to each male in the group over 21. They sailed from London in late August and arrived in late October. The minister of the Ebenezer Lutheran Church in GA was a prominent abolitionist, the Rev. Martin Bolzius, who wrote back to London with his impressions that the Swabian arrivals were "honest, well behaved and industrious," but "mostly poor, having paid away their money for passage and other necessaries of life." De Brahms surveyed land for the new settlers at a place called Blue Bluff, where they all moved in December, 1751. This place was about five miles further up the Savannah river from the previous Salzburger settlers.

Thomas Mock, b. 12 Aug 1733, would have been 18 at the time the settlers came to Savannah. There were at least three other male Mocks in the group--Bartholomew, Jacob and Wolfgang. All four may have been brothers, and one or more of their sisters may also have been part of the group. The Scott monograph speculates: "The parents of this family seems not to have come with them, and it is possible Michael Winecoff acted as a sort of guardian or mentor to them." The Mocks and Winecoffs engaged in farming, and possibly also silk culture, there for about twenty years. Sons of Michael Winecoff married daughters fo these Mocks, and Thomas Mock (1) married Mary Winecoff, a daughter of Michael, who would have been a very young girl in 1751. Then, around 1770, "some from each family moved together to North Carolina...Mocks still live in Effingham Co., but there appear to have been no Winecoffs there after the 1820's...When this happened is not known now, but was sometime between the marriage of Mary and Thomas in Georgia in April 1765, and the first recorded sale of land in N.C. to Michael

Winecoff in Cabarrus Co., NC by Samuel Suther in 1771."
The Scott monograph stops with the move to N.C. leaving for a "later chapter" the "intriguing why" of the move north.

I once supposed the "why" may have been objection to slavery, given the abolitionist sentiments of their minister in GA, Rev. Martin Bolzius, but that seems not to have been it, since there were negroes in their household in 1800 [census record], and those surely must have been slaves. North Carolina was an American frontier area in the latter half of the 18th century, and up until the opening of the Northwest Territory around the turn of the century. Thomas (I) and Mary Winecoff Mock made their homestead in Cabarrus Co. near her father Michael and her older brother John Michael Winecoff, whose wife, Barbara, may also have been a Mock. There they raised a family of at least six children: Thomas, Michael, John, Margaret, Elizabeth and Magdalene. Not much else is known of their life there during the next twenty years.

Michael Mock (I), who was probably named for Michael Winecoff, and for whom my great grandfather Michael Mock II was named, was born in Cabarrus Co., N.C. just before the war, on Oct 2, 1775.

The Thomas Mock (I) household broke up sometime after 1800. This may have been shortly after Thomas Mock (I) died 5 Jan 1807.

A letter from Mrs. H.A. Scott (to the Davies Co. History Librarian, dated 10/9/1979) says "It is our understanding that Thomas Mock II was the founder of Mocksville and that he and his mother are buried in Mocksville."

Of the other children of Thomas Mock (I), I only know something of my ancestor Michael Mock (I). According to his grand-daughter, Phoebe Mock (sister of my great grandfather, Michael Mock II, whose memories are recorded in Commemorative BiographicalRecord of Prominent and Representative Men of Indianapolis and Vicinity (J.H. Beers & Co. 1908): "He (Michael I) was married Aug 2 1804 to Anna Barbara Beaver, b. 15 May 1787, and they removed between 1812 and 1815 to Butler Co., OH, locating near Hamilton in the early settlement of the county."

While Michael Mock did eventually move to Butler Co., the move was not direct—in the 1820 census, the Michael Mock family is found in Union Twp. of nearby Clermont Co., OH. In 1830 they are in st. Clair Twp. of Butler Co. Anna Barbara (Beaver) Mock died 30 Oct 1821, probably in Clermont Co.

The application, dated 1 Aug 1804, for the marriage of Michael Mock and Anna Barbara Beaver is a notice of a bond posted by Michael Mock and a Davott Beaver (or maybe Davolt Beaver—the handwritten signature leaves some doubt). The bond guaranteed that there was no reason to prohibit the marriage. The signature on the bond makes it very probably that Davolt (Devott) Beaver is Anna Barbara's father or a close relative. The marriage

was in Rowan Co., N.C. which neighbors Cabarrus Co....

Phoebe Mock's recollections continue with the biography of her grandfather Michael Mock I: "His children were: Elizabeth b. 25 May 1805; Thomas b. 13 Dec 1806; Mary b. 30 Mar 1808; Henry b. 9 May 1810; Simeon b. 1 Dec 1812 - all in N.C.; Alexander b. 15 Jun 1815; Nancy b. 27 Mar 1818; and John b. 1 Jun 1820. The latter three were born in Butler Co., OH. All came to Indiana except Thomas who d. 3 Feb 1807 in N.C." Michael Mock I never remarried. Elizabeth would have been 16 at the time her mother died, so maybe she did the woman's work in the household before the family's move to Oaklandon, IN. We can infer from the above that the family of Michael (I) moved from N.C. to OH sometime after 1807 and from census records, we know they were in OH by 1820.

A short biography of John Mock in History of Indianapolis and Marion Co., IN (pg844) says: "John Mock was b. 1 Jun 1820 in Butler Co., OH. At the age of three years he went with his father to Ripley Co., IN; lived there for three years and returned to OH; remained there until 1831 and ...then came to Lawrence Twp., Marion Co. with his father Michael Mock I." - My guess is that the death of Anna Barbara somehow precipitated the move to IN and that the move back to a different community in OH was to join Beaver relatives in Butler Co. who could help care for or educate the young children of the family.

The Phoebe Mock piece goes on to say: "Mr. Mock (Michael I) removed to near Germantown, Lawrence Twp., Marion Co., IN where in 1832 or 1833 (in his late 50's) he entered land, taking up 80 acres for himself and giving each son \$200 that they might enter 40 acres each. His daughters received a like amount.

He built a hewed log house, one mile south of Germantown, which is still standing (i.e. in 1880), and there diedin October, 1843 in the faith of the Lutheran Church." Germantown, IN was a small community on the south side of Fall Creek on the eastern border of Marion Co. Michael Mock I is buried in the Bills Cemetery, which is on a hill overlooking old Germantown, which is now flooded by Geist Reservoir. The wooded area around this cemetery has been recently developed for upscale residence. The sandstone slab gravestone of Michael Mock I was intact, leaning against a tree in 1989, but, according to my uncle, Samuel C. Mock, disappeared sometime before 1994.

EPHRAIM & ELEANOR MAUK BIRD Submitted by Loraine Rae

Loraine wrote the following article for the History of Washington County, Tennessee 1988 from information from her files and from Marian Rust and Gertrude Stuhr.

Ethan Ephraim and Eleanor Mauk Bird continued the pioneering spirit which had brought their ancestors from Europe to East Tennessee. Seven years after their marriage, 5 Sep 1829, they moved, with their sons, Samuel and James, to Madison Co., IN, then to Mercer Co., IL for about twenty years, settling about 1856 in Oakland, Iowa. Ephraim died 17 July 1892, buried Belknap Center Cemetery, Oakland. Eleanor died 21 Jan 1898, buried beside her husband.

Eleanor (or Ellender), born 1812, Mauktown, Washington Co., TN, was the oldest of the eleven children of Samuel Mauk (1790-1876) and Mary "Polly" Broyles (1795-1865). Samuel built the first cold blast furnace on the Nolichucky River. He was the son of John and Elizabeth Heiser Mauk who came to Tennessee about 1799. Polly was the daughter of Ellender and James Broyles. Ellender, the daughter of Matthias & Eva Klug Broyles and James, the son of Jacob and Elizabeth Yowell Broyles. Matthias and Jacob were sons of Jacob and Mary Catherine Fleishman Broyles.

Ephraim Bird was one of twelve children of David & Mary Broyles Bird, married 14 Feb 1804 in Greene Co., TN. Mary was the daughter of Matthias and Eva Klug Broyles. The Broyles, Klugs and Fleishmans were settlers of the Germanna Colony of Virginia.

Ephraim and Eleanor has three daughters and six sons, all but one of whom survived them. There were: Samuel Bird (1832-1904) m. Martha Ann Etchison James Matthias Bird (1834-1912) m. Mary E. Etchison Mary Bird m. James Calvin John Bird (1839-1909) m. Sally Bush Philip Bird (1841-1911) m. Susan Alice Huff Jacob Bird (1843-1915) m. Mary Bates Franklin "Dock" Bird (1847-1928) m. Maria Huff Tempa Bird b. ca1850 Martha Bird m. (1) Henry Newton,(2) Zach Strong

Eleanor Mauk Bird's obituary in the Oakland, lowa newspaper marked her passing: "Thus again has another old settler passed away, one that has seen wonderful changes wrought in this country. She came here with her husband when this country was yet an unbroken wilderness, and has lived to see it dotted all over with pleasant groves, fertile farms and happy homes..."

BEDFORD CO. PENNSYLVANIA MOCKS By Fred Ickes

Jacob Mock whose wife was Merci Dority and Peter Mock whose wife was Elizabeth Sample have been assumed by others to be brothers. I am inclined to agree with this. Jacob first taxed in 1775 in Bedford Co.,PA and Peter first taxed in 1785, also in Bedford Co. lived fairly close to each other.

There are six different Mock lines in Bedford County, either settling here or passing through. (I list lacob and Peter as separate lines).

Jacob, whose wife was Susannah Walter was the son of Jacob and Barbara (Messenheimer) Mock. Orphan Court records verify this. He was a grandson of Jacob and Merci Dority Mock.

John, whose wife was Ann Maria, was Peter Mock's son, John. They had no children. Mary Eve, wife of Adam Mock (John's brother) was left a substantial part of John's estate.

The paper that the Wilson brothers put out on the Mock-Mittong family has errors that have traveled the country over....As you had in an article in the MFH, family tradition is not too reliable. The Walkin Waterman 1884 History of Bedford, Somerset, & Fulton Counties has errors also for the same reason. [information given by distant relatives].

I'm sure that I can make mistakes also, mostly because I have accepted some one elses work without checking into it.

1 did a genealogy on Jacob Mock in 1994 - 4500 descendants.

I recently mailed to the printer the manuscript of a second edition of the Peter Mock line, Vol. I - The first 4 children of Peter Mock. since publishing the Peter Mock genealogy, I have had probably 4000 more names of descendants added to my records. Information is continuing to turn up.

The Peter Mock and Jacob Mock families are intermarried, which adds to the confusion.

"Mack or Mock"

I just came across your MOCK homepage. Very Nice! From the page: "The name of "Mack" in America is often traced to New England and ultimately from Scotland, England or Ireland. This group usually pronounces the name as "Mack" as in "Mack Truck" or "BigMack". This New England group is not included in this study. It is of interest that the Mack Truck Co. was started by an Allentown, PA German family and illustrates the change in pronunciation that can occur. The name of "Mack" which in German is pronounced as "Mock" is also seen in American Palantine immigrants, many who originally arrived in PA and later moved to other states, and especially throughout the midwest and South."

I have MACK ancestors (some of the descendants did marry into MOCK families) that came from Ireland (Robert MACK came 1803 to Indiana Co., PA) In researching this family I think, but can't prove, that the family came from Ballymacarne North Townland, Magheradrool parish, County Down. In researching the records there, I came across a deed from 1720 that concerned a George Mack and his brother John Mack (as named in the index), however in the body of the deed George referred to his brother as "Hans", suggesting a German origin for the name. There were quite a few of the 1709er's (Palantines") that went from Germany to Ireland. Have you considered this possibility that some of the Mack's from Ireland may also have been German? Just a thought...

MOCKS OF ZOAR, OHIO - A Different Family By Steve Lapp

In the 1830 Census of Lawrence Township, Tuscarawas County, Ohio, we find a family of 15 females headed by one Joanna MOCK. The oldest resident was between age 60 and 70, while the three youngest were between 15 and 20. How can this be - a family of all women? The answer lies in the fascinating story of ZOAR.

In August of 1817, the same year that Lawrence Township was incorporated, a ragged group of Separatists from Germany arrived by ship in Philadelphia. Most of them were from Wurtemberg and the rest were from Baden and Bavaria. Having withdrawn from the Lutheran and Catholic faiths, they had been persecuted under King Frederick, and to a lesser degree by the successor King William. They numbered about 350 when they arrived in America, poor and friendless. However, they were welcomed and aided by Quakers. Nonetheless, they sought a home of their own. Their chosen leader, Joseph Bimeler, managed to purchase 5,500 acres - mostly in Lawrence Townshiip - entirely on credit. Most of the emigrants settled there in the spring of 1818, while a few remained in Pennsylvania. They named their new home in honor of the city to which Lot fled from Sodom and Gomorrah.

Early on, the group operated as a communal society. Individuals possessed no property rights whatsoever. Each member's labors were for the benefit of the whole. In the beginning these new and strange Americans were quite destitute. (50 of them died of cholera in 1832.) But through the years, ZOAR grew and prospered and by 1884 had become a quaint and well-to-do village, still having a population of around 250 adults and 100 children. For the most part, husbands lived apart from wives, males separate from females and children in their own nursery. This explains Joanna MOCK and her 15 woman household.

The Society of Zoar was still very active in 1884, when the History of Tuscarawas County was published by Warner, Beers and Co. (Source of much of this article). But a few years later the group divided up the land and disbanded. Much of ZOAR remains as an historical monument, and today is quite an interesting and beautiful attraction in that part of Ohio.

I assume that Joanna MOCK arrived with the main group in 1817; however, I have not seen proof of this. Since the 1830 Census only listed the 'head of household', and not all of the residents, we do not know if other individuals with the surname MOCK lived in the ZOAR community at that time. However, the 1850 Census of ZOAR finds Joanna MOCK in the same place (apparently), still listed as head of household, age 63 and born in Germany. Eight other people also resided there and are named this time, including 3 MOCKS:

Matthew MOCK, age 40, occupation "nurseryman", born in Germany

Elizabeth MOCK, age 31 - born in Ohio Dorotha MOCK, age 4/12 [4 months] b. Ohio

It appears likely that Matthew is a son of Joannna, married to Elizabeth with a daughter, Dorotha - but we don't know this for sure.

To confuse things, another prominant Mock family also moved to Lawrence Township about the same time. To quote the same History of Tuscarawas County, "John Mock came from Pennsylvania about 1815. In religious belief he was a Dunkard. He later removed to Kosciusko county, Indiana. George Mock, his brother, was also an early settler in the township and remained there throughout his life... John Mock built the first sawmill in Lawrence Township. George Mock is said to have operated the first distillery in about 1820. One of the first residents of the village of Lawrenceville was a shoe-maker, Mr. MOCK [first name not given by the authors!". The family of these two MOCK brothers has been well documented by several Mock Family Historian researchers, and has been written about in earlier issues. They were sons of "Soldier" George Mock of York, Pennsylvania and his wife, Eva. |See "Which George is Who?" article in the first issue of Mock Family Historian - July 1991]. Were these two Mock families related in any way? We can speculate, but have no evidence to suggest they even knew each other. Perhaps one or several of us will have the good fortune to visit ZOAR someday and inquire at the small museum there about Joanna Mock and her house of fifteen women. Several books have also been written about this community - one with beautiful photographs and drawings of ZOAR; but neither book contained much about Joanna and her kin.

LITTLE BERRY MOCK

And the search goes on!

MFH member, Ella Mock Taylor has been searching for several years for the parents of Little Berry Mock. Mid-December the following message came over the Mock Home Page: "I am very excited to see that someone else is doing Mock Genealogy. My family has been in So. Alabama for six generations. The best info I have has one Little Berry Mock coming to Alabama from South Carolina in the early 1800's. The book, The Folks from Pea Ridge, written by Wyley Donald Ward has the following information:

About the year 1830, Little Berry Mock moved his family from Wilkinson Co., GA to Conecuh Co., AL. All that is known of the Mocks before this time is that Little Berry and his wife, Jane, were born in So. Carolina. Little BerryMock was married before 1805 and by 1820 he had moved to WilkinsonCo., GA, where he lived with his wife and six children (four

sons and two daughters).

George Mock, Little Berry's brother had married and was living in Jefferson Co. in 1820 with his wife, four sons and six daughters. After coming to Alabama, Little Berry and Jane Mock apparently lived on a farm in Pea Ridge until their deaths. The following is a list of Little Berry and Jane Mock's known family:

Little Berry Mock b. 1780 - d. 1850's Jane Mock b. 1780 - d. 1850's

William Mock b. 8 Jan 1808; d. 1 Aug 1885 m. Sarah Smith, d/o Abraham & Delilah Smith (my GG Grandparents)

Mary Mock b. 1809; m. William Hassell Nancy Mock b. 1813; m. Wm. Padgett Jr. Jacob Mock b. 1815; m. Rachael Smith L.B. Jackson Mock b. 1818; m. Elizabeth

That is the extent of what I know of our connection. The family or at least some of them were loyalists. My grandfather's name was Arthur M. Mock, he had a brother, Loren. They would have been born approximately 1880-1890 in either Western Massachusetts or in the Troy, NY area.

He was an active and ardent Tory because as a new immigrant he was forced to take an allegiance to the King, and he honored this agreement...

Many of Johannes Valentine Mock's descendants came back to New York after the war and scattered over New York and some of the other New England states. Much of the information on this family came from Ian R. Smith who wrote a series of articles on this line in a journal called Reflections of Yesterday, Missisquoi Historical Society Reports Vol. 19, 1986

MOCK-GEN-L DISCUSSION GROUP ON THE INTERNET by Ron Moore

The Mock Family Historian now has its own free discussion grouup on the Internet, dedicated to research of all variations of the name. It has been named MOCK-GEN-L and can be reached by most individuals who have a computer, modem and Internet e-mail access.

Many in the past isolated themselves to a single informational service for doing on-line genealogical research. They had only a limited database of information, restricted to others signed up on the same service. Now most of these companies allow a free Internet connection as part of their service, and this has vastly enlarged the number of persons who can participate in an Internet group and tends to draw genealogists closer together rather than apart as was being done under the old system.

No matter if the Internet gateway is through Prodigy, GEnie, AOL, Compuserve, Delphi, the Microsoft Network, a University, Commercial Business or any other type of a direct connection, all can now meet together on the Internet.

We have found that individuals choose one of the above services over another for a number of reasons. Some because of better genealogy services; their spouse may prefer one over the other because of better stock market reporting or homemaking services; superior programs for children or teenagers; because most of their friends use a given service; the only one that offers a local toll free connection in their community or the least expensive cost. We now advise people to choose the service that is the best for them. In many cases that connection currently can be obtained for no more than about \$10 per month which usually includes several hours of free on-lin service. Connections that give unlimited access to the Internet are generally more expensive.

A List Server is a software program on a remote computer that works by delivering messages to your personal e-mail address automatically and if you reply to the List, your message is echoed out to all who have subscribed. As of this writing there are nearly 50 people signed up and participating with MOCK-GEN-L. Already several new cousins have met and are sharing research. The success has been much greater than anticipated.

New members are being attracted to the Mock Family Historian. The old image of a genealogist as someone who searches old graveyards and dusty courthouses is rapidly disappearing, although it is still important for some to continue with the conventional type of research.

If you have not already experienced the benefits of the Internet and World Wide Web as a genealogist, we invite you to get on the "Electronic Superhighway" of the next century because it is already here! Most of the Editorial Staff of the Mock Family Historian, including Barbara Dittig, our editor, are monitoring on-line. MICHAEL & RACHEL MOCK FAMILY of Elkhart County, Indiana

by Eugene G. Mock

For several years now I have been researching my ggg-grandfather Michael Mock. Michael Mock was born 27 May 1782 at Little York, York Co. PA., the son of Johann George and Maria Eva Mack/Mock. Michael moved with his family from York Co. to Bedford Co., PA about 1794. Michael Mock married Rachel ca1803.

In a deed record dated 18 Apr 1806 Michael Mock of Greenfield Twp. Bedford Co. for and in consideration of twenty five pounds lawful money of Pennsylvania paid by John Engle do bargain sell and deliver two black cows and one calf, one mouse coulered mare. two acres of wheat in the ground and two iron kettles.

In the 1810 Census Michael Mock shows up in Greenfield Twp. Bedford Co. PA. Michael is listed in his father George Mock's will dated 8 Jan 1810 in Bedford Co.,PA.

In a listing of residents in Bedford Co. PA in 1814 Michael Mock is listed in Greenfield Twp as 27 years old, a farmer.

Listed in the Treasurer deeds for Bedford Co. Common Pleas Docket 1, dated 29 Jun 1816, for 50 acres of unseated land in the name of Michael Mock situated in Greenfield Twp. sold for county tax to Samuel Riddle.

Michael Mock moved to Ohio about 1816. In 1819 he shows up on a State Census in Goshen, Clermont Co.,OH. Michael buys property in Goshen in 1820 and sells it in 1823 while a resident of Warren Co., OH. Then on to Montgomery Co,OH where in the 1830 census he is listed in Clay Twp. Final destination is Elkhart Co., IN where in Nov 1834 son George Mock buys property.

Michael Mock settles on eighty acres of land on the W half of the SW quarter of section 29 in Township 37 N of Range 6E in Elkhart Co. IN. I have been unable to locate the original land deed for this property.

On 7 Nov 1838, George Mock and John Mock are appointed by the Clerk of the Probate Court of Elkhart Co. as administrators of the Estate of Michael Mock, deceased.

A petition was filed 2 Dec 1847 in Elkhart Co, IN Probate Court by James Cook and Rachel Mock; versus John, Jacob and Daniel Mock; William and Nancy McBee (non-residents of IN.); and Lovina, Emiline, Caroline and Mary Ann Replogle. This petition concerned with the property of the late Michael Mock.

My gg-grandfather, Michael Mock moved with his brother, Daniel Mock in 1849 to Polk and Guthrie Co., Iowa along with their mother, Rachel Mock. The rest of the family stayed in Indiana.

Philip Peter Cosner and wife immigrated to Philadelphia with their three year old son & six month old daughter, arriving on 1 Nov 1763 on the Chance. The clerk spelled his name CASNER, and Philip Peter signed with his mark. After living a while in Buck Co,PA, taking the oath of Allegiance on 5 Dec 1777 and enrolling as an Associator under Capt. Wm. McCalla's Plumstead Co., 2nd Battalion for 1775-76, and later being counted in the WashingtonCo,PA Census of 1790, Philip Peter Cosner moved to Hardy Co., (now Grant Co.) W.Va.

Philip Peter purchased land (Bk A:60) one mile east of the top of Allegheny Mt. Iying below Route 42 and moved there with his wife and son, Jacob and his family. They are buried there in what is today known as the Geisert Cemetery. Philip Peter Cosner's will was probated in Hardy Co. on 11 May 1819 and named his wife Catherine, sons, Christian, Jacob, Adam, Philip, John and daughter Elizabeth Maak. The executor was Christian Cosner with witnesses George Schell & Francis Idleman signing (BK 3:8, Judy, 316). [Judy, 316?? – not clear to me /wmc]

Michel MOCK enlisted 25 Sep 1758, First Troop of Georgia Rangers; Capt. John Milledge commander. (Spelled "Michael MACK" in May 18, 1764 Roster list of same troop, also on Aug 27, 1764 list.)

John MACK and Frederick MACK on roster of South Carolina Militia in the 1759 Cherokee Expedition, reported June 6, 1760 under command of Colonel John Chevillette.

From same source John MAGGS, 5 feet, 6 inches tall, age 17, planter from Virginia, enlisted May 1756 in Capt. Charles Lewis Co. of VA Militia. Cont'd pg.13

I believe this could very well be John Mauck, son of Peter Maag/Mauck of the Shenandoah Valley, since we know that this John was b. 25 Nov 1739 and baptised at Opecquon in old Frederick Co., VA

Answer to Steve's find from the Internet -

That is a very interesting find about John Maggs of VA being on the Cherokee march of 1756. I would agree that this certainly could be John Mauck, b. 1739, son of Peter Mauck of Tom's Brook. If this is true, this would be one of the earliest references to him after his birth in 1739. As you know, Rev. John Casper Stoever spelled the family name in that record as Maag, so that was not doubt an earlier spelling than Mauck.

As we have discussed, it seems very likely this Peter Mauck family had connections in the South. You very nicely proved a couple of years ago that Andrew Mock, son of Peter Mauck was in Rowan Co., NC shortly after the Revolutionary war, and he is very likely the person that Mocksville, NC was named, since he owned the property where this town was later established. In 1822 this area became Davidson Co., NC. Prior to your documentation, it had been presumed that this Andrew was a son of the other Peter Mock married to Barbara Martin and who was an early immigrant to N.C.

I wonder if the John and Frederick Mack you located in 1759 on the Cherokee relocation could be this same John Mauck with his brother Frederick? Frederick married Margaret and later went to N.C. from the Shenandoah Valley of Virginia after the Revolutionary war. This is all a lot of speculation. Maybe someone else can identify this Frederick and John Mack. I have no idea who this Michael Mock/ Mack could be.

Anybody want to claim him??
