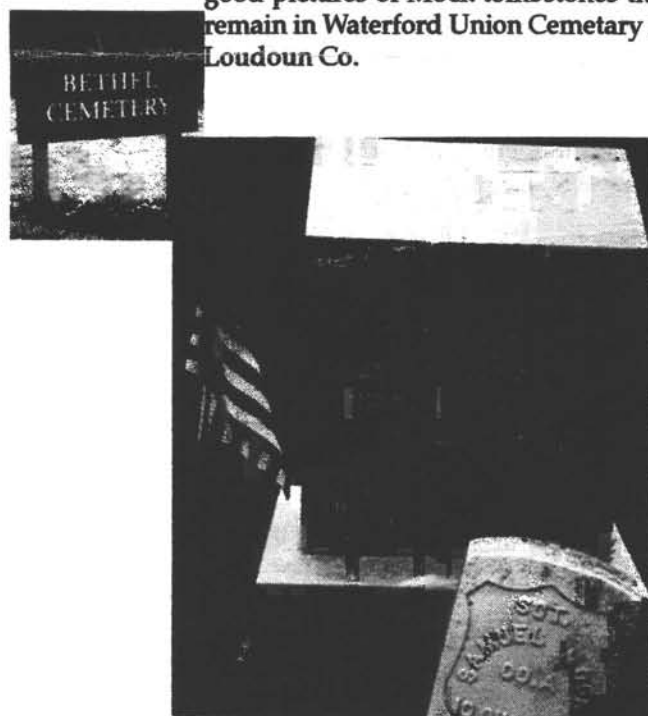

I feel that the contents should be put someplace where others can get to the information. This letter seems to be the only correspondence between them.

Dear Mrs. Mock:

Thank you for your letter of Aug. 16, 1982. Since we have recently moved to N.C., your letter was forwarded to us at our new address.

My husband's ancestor was James Richard MOCK, born 13 May 1826, who married Martha Birkhead in Nelson Co. Kentucky. Martha Birkhead was the daughter of Abraham Birkhead whose Bible my father-in-law has.

In the Bible are the following MOCK's:

Reuben Abraham Mock	born July 11, 1852

These are the grandchildren of Abraham Birkhead and his wife Mary Allen. One of Abraham Birkhead's other daughters, Mary Birkhead married George Mock. We believe the George Ann Mock listed in the Bible is the daughter of Mary and George Mock and that the other four children are from the family of Martha and James Richard Mock.

In the Bible there is also the notation "Anch? L. Mock buried? (or borned?) Oct. 10, 1949. The Title page of the Bible says: "English Version Polyglott Bible, published by DeSilver, Thomas and Co. Philadelphia, by Thomas Cowperthwait and Co. No. 253 Market Street. 1836" Others who have written to me who are working on the MOCK lines are Peggy B. Tucker and Mr. Kenneth P. Darling [deceased].

I may do some research here in NC whenever I am able to get to the archives in Raleigh. Let's keep in touch. I will let you know if I ever come across anything on your line.

Descendants of George Muck of Harrison Co., IN by Steven Coulter

I descend from Rebecca (Muck) Keller (1803-1881), dau of George Mock/Muck (1771-1837 Harrison Co. IN), son of George Mock & Sophia Muller. The younger George's surname is spelled Muck on his tombstone. I saw it about 30 years ago—or rather pieces of it. The adjoining farmer had allowed his fences to deteriorate, so his cattle could graze in the cemetery. George Muck's stone had been knocked over & smashed into many pieces.

I just found all the impressive Mock websites; and I appreciated viewing your working charts.

I wonder where you got the nickname "Margaret" for Rebecca (Muck) Keller? I have not encountered that before. Rebecca's husband was Henry Keller, son of Henry Keller & Margaret Snapp. I wonder if possibly someone found a land record back in Shenandoah Co., VA, with the names Henry & Margaret Keller, and mistook the senior Henry Keller for his son Henry? Just a thought.

Rebecca & Henry were married July 25, 1821 in Harrison Co., IN. Their daughter Elisabeth (1828-1870) was my great-grandmother. She married 1852 to George Creclius (1828-1919), and they migrated from Harrison Co., IN, to Marshall Co., IA, several years later, along with many of his siblings & their families.

I will be happy to exchange data with anyone researching this lineage.

I've been overwhelmed on the home front, but managed to add slightly to 'paper trail' of one group of MOCK who descended from Johannes Mock on chart #19a. (Recall, I'm an Owen/STEWART/Womack researcher, and keep bumping into MOCK.)

Below is one David Mock, ??father of Charles Mock #1.3.6.1!! You certainly have more insight than I. Does deed 3:161, 162 give insight into the question 'where did David Mock (father of Charles) reside'?

Deed 3:161, 162. 27 Sept. 1825.

Benjamin Hawkins of Randolph Co. NC, Abner Devaney & Patsey, his wife of Guilford Co., NC to David Mock for \$31.50, 21 acres adj. David Mock, Henry Burrow, the heirs of Solomon Park, dec'd. & the heirs of Jacob Myers, dec'd. on the waters of Hambays Creek, it being a tract of land descended to them as part of the heirs of Mary Hawkins, dec'd. (wife of John Hawkins), who was the heir of John Goodman, Jur., dec'd. Wit: J. A. Hogan, W. Leach. John Paxton took the oath of Patsey Devaney. Prov. Dec. Session 1826.

Jan Tompkins' Misc. Mock Research



From Out of the Wilderness: The Brethren and Two Centuries of Life in Central Pennsylvania (1780-1980) by Earl C. Kaylor Jr. :

Writing about Morrisons Cove, "called the Great Cove until about 1770," an area with no public road until the 1800s, which he says begins about Pattonville in Bedford County and ends at Williamsburg on the Juniata River. The first land purchases were in mid 1760s but settlement mostly delayed for another 20 yrs.

"Then there was John Holsinger, a widower of Brethren parentage from Franklin County who sometime around 1780 took possession of land just south of Bakers Summit on the eastern slope of Dunning Mountain. In 1797 he married Elizabeth Mack, a great-granddaughter of the church's founder.... John and Elizabeth were progenitors of a distinguished lineage of church leaders, some of whom were the founders of the Dunning Creek congregation..." (footnote gives sources in appendix.)

.....

"Other Brethren would follow these pathfinders into the Cove soon after the turn of the century. Their life would only be a little less harsh than that of their predecessors. Here in 1806, for instance, came Alexander Mack's grandson, William to live out his years with daughter Elizabeth and her husband, John Holsinger, in their Bakers Summit home....

"The pattern of Brethren settlement in that part of Middle District where William Mack chose to spend his last days is obvious. There were three centers in the Cove: New Enterprise (or what the 1925 history calls the headwaters of Yellow Creek); Roading Spring-Martinsburg; and Clover Creek...."

I hadn't realized that when I landed at the Altoona airport, which is near Martinsburg, [for the 1998 Mock Conference] that I was in the Morrisons Cove area, or I might have paid more attention.

For Mock I found this item on p 86-87 concerning the Dunning Creek congregation, established 1840:

"A nucleus of Brethren had settled near present-day Pleasantville by 1843. In that year George M. Holsinger, whose mother was Elizabeth Mack, a great-granddaughter of Alexander Mack, and Moses Rogers were called to the ministry. Holsinger in 1841 had moved across the Cove Mountain from Bakers Summit to a farm three miles west of Alum Bank. In the fall of 1843 the small colony of Brethren Dunning Creek began the erection of a log meetinghouse, finished the next year, on three-quarters of an acre donated

by Christian Mock, whose wife was a member. This log building, located two miles from Pleasantville, became known as the Mock Church...."

The following comments are about the church where we held Sunday services at the Bedford Conference two years ago:

"The Mock Church still stands, although very much dilapidated and unfit for regular services. The Gospel Messenger reported in 1892 that June 17th of that year had been set aside to clean up the church and the graveyard, which had fallen into neglect. Forty workers turned out, including a number of children, who gathered moss and placed it around the weed-choked graves their elders had cleared off. According to the denomination's paper, the last regular service at the Mock Church was held in mid-September 1893.

"Today the original wooden peg benches without backs, the pulpit standing flat on the floor, and the Spartan decor give one a good idea of what the atmosphere in the historic log-walled relic must have been like a century and a quarter ago. In September 1954 a special service was held there to discuss the possibilities of restoring the church...."

Other Mock listings:

Page 162, Robert G. Mock is listed among ministers of the Everett PA Church of the Brethren, he from 1953-1958.

Page 181, concerning the Bedford PA church:

"In early 1956 the District Ministry and Missions Commission appointed a committee of three—Elmer E Ebersole of Martinsburg, Robert G Mock of Everett, C H Cameron of Altoona—to work out a plan for locating and contacting Brethren residing in Bedford and its vicinity..." The trio located 65 families and apparently established a church in that town.

Eli & Sarah (Bigler) Mock biography

This portion of a bio for Eli Mock was included on a xerox copy of a page from the 1986 Koskiusko Indiana county history, sent in by Otto Poehlman Jr., Cassopolis Michigan:

"...prospered at his farming operation.

"It was after he moved to Starke County that his children grew to maturity and married. It was also here that they lost their oldest child and only son, Cyrus.

"Two of Eli's brothers, Daniel and Ira, also moved to Starke County, where they lived in close proximity and could exchange help as needed.

"Eli was of the Dunkard religion; he and his brother, Ira, served as deacons in the Salem Church west of Burr Oak.

"Early in 1912, nearing the age of 67, Eli retired from farming, moved into Culver, and rented his farm.

He died on October 24, 1914, and Sarah continued to rent the farm for another two years, at which time she disposed of the land. She continued living in Culver until her death on January 11, 1928. They are buried in the Burr Oak Cemetery in Marshall County, a few miles east of their farm home.

"The children of Eli and Sarah (Bigler) Mock were as follows: Cyrs, born 1866, died 1893, never married. Kathryn Ann, born 1869, died 1940, in 1890 she married W. Daniel Wolfe. M. Isabelle, born 1870, died 1899, married Walter Carpenter in 1899. Lavina, born 1874, died 1952, married Amos Bottorff. Julia Alice, born 1880, died 1926, in 1900 married William Joseph. And Lenora, born 1882, died 1964, who married in 1901, W. Benjamin Hawkins. — Otto Poehlman, Jr., Cassopolis, Michigan."

While whoever photocopied this didn't get the whole item on Eli Mock, there is a bio for Eli's parents, George and Julia (Beghtel) Mock. Eli is listed among their nine children with his wife's name Sarah Bigler, says he was born 1845 in Indiana.

FRENCH AND INDIAN WAR CASUALTIES

If you're searching for records of ancestors who may have been killed in the French and Indian War, you probably know by now that records of the latter 1700's are difficult to find. Church records may be the only source of information for deaths (as well as marriages and births) during this time. These records might also document immigration routes and early skirmishes between settlers and the Indians.

You also may want to search early land and tax records. Applications for land ownership listed the applicants' names and often verified their lineage.

Rebecca & Henry Mauck of Page Co. VA

I've been researching the children of John Conrad Aleshire, an ancestor, and I've found some information that will supplement your charts concerning the children of David Mauck and Sarah Stroup [Chart #23A - Rudolph > Daniel > David]. I viewed your working charts that are linked to the Mauck Family Historian Homepage @ <http://mock.rootsweb.com/>.

Thanks for presenting your material, it was very interesting. May I cite your work and / or make a link to your charts? I plan to post an outline of my research concerning the Aleshire / Aleshire family at Rootsweb also. They're awfully nice to make all those resources available to us family history enthusiasts. Following this note is some information that will be useful, I hope, for Rebecca Mauck and her brother Isaac Mauck. I know you are aware of some of this information, but I believe some will be news.

The will of John C. Aleshire mentions the heirs of Peggy Mauck, late wife of Henry Mauck. Peggy was already deceased by 19 Nov 1842 when the will was written. Henry and Peggy's children are noted in the settlement of the estate which occurred between 1847 and 1855. There may also be some useful information about the children in here. For instance, Henry and Peggy's son Isaac C. Mauck was still living in 1853 and 1855. He apparently reached his majority of 21 in 1853. I don't see anything about him in your charts.

Henry's sister Rebecca married the widower Henry P. Aleshire, one of Peggy (Aleshire) Mauck's brothers. I can document what happened to Rebecca and Henry after they left Page county circa 1832. Henry and Rebecca had no children that I have discovered, although Henry had at least a daughter and probably a son by his first marriage to Priscilla Burner. After Henry P. Aleshire died in 1868; Rebecca lived in Seneca Co., OH with her sister Martha (Mauck) (Hershberger) Seitz in 1870. In 1878 and 1880 Rebecca was living with a brother, Isaac Mauck, and his family in Muscatine, Iowa. Rebecca apparently died there in about 1885 according to Henry Aleshire's War of 1812 pension records.

I see from your charts that you don't know what became of Isaac Mauck, one of Henry and Rebecca's younger brothers. It appears from my information that he lived until after 1880, and was married to Charlotte, who born circa 1824 in Ohio. Isaac and Charlotte had at least one son, Isaac W. Mauck, born in Iowa in about 1856.

Will of John Conrad Aleshire, transcribed by myself from microfilm copy of the Will book. Page Co., VA Will Book C., p. 179.

I John C. Aleshire of the County of Page and the State of Virginia do hereby make my last Will and Testa-

ment, in manner and form following, that is to Say.

1st. I desire that all the perishable part of my Estate, be Immediately Sold after my Decease and out of the monies arising therefrom, all my Just debts and funeral Expenses be paid, Should the perishable part of my property prove insufficient for the above purposes, Then I desire that my Executor hereafter named, Shall pay the same out the money which he is to pay out on account of the Land which I have herein willed to him and his heirs forever.

2ndly. After the payment of my debts (if any) and funeral expenses, I give to my son Jonas Aleshire his heirs and assigns forever, all the land which I own lying and being in the County of Page, Consisting of five tracts all adjoining each other, one tract of one hundred and ninety two acres, and another tract of Twelve and a half acres, another Tract of Twenty acres, another tract of Fifty four and a half acres, containing on the whole three hundred and seventy nine acres, be the same more or less, Upon the following conditions, That is to say my son Jonas Aleshire is to pay the sum of Eight hundred dollars to the rest of my heirs, in payments of one hundred and fifty dollars yearly, the first payment to become due, one year after my decease, the money to be equally divided between my two Sons Daniel Aleshire and Henry P. Aleshire, and my two Daughters Katherine Decious, formerly Katherine Aleshire, and Elizabeth Hollingsworth, formerly Elizabeth Aleshire, and the Children of my deceased Daughter Peggy Mock, formerly Peggy Aleshire.

3rdly. It is my will and desire that the money which may be coming from my Estate, to my Daughter Elizabeth Hollingsworth, shall be paid to her, or her children in order that her husband John Hollingsworth may not have it in his power, to make away with or waste it.

4thly. It is also my will and desire, that no part of the money coming from my Estate to the Children of my deceased Daughter, Peggy Mock, Shall be paid to their father Henry Mock, in order that he may have it in his power to make away with or waste it..

And lastly I do hereby appoint and Constitute my son Jonas Aleshire Executor of this my last Will and Testament, hereby revoking all other wills, or Testaments, by me heretofore made.

In witness whereof, I have hereby Set my hand and affixed my Seal this nineteenth day of November in the year of our Lord, one thousand Eight hundred and forty two.

At a court contained and held for the County of Page on Tuesday the 25th. day of May 1847. The last Will and Testament of John C. Aleshire decd. was proved by the oaths of Col. Andrew Keyser and Charles Keyser witnesses thereto and it is ordered to be recorded....

Teste Wm. C. Lauck CC

Page Co., VA Will Book C., p. 207, 208.

The inventory and appraisement of the personal estate of John C. Aleshire, decd. was recorded October 22, 1847. The sale of said estate occurred on the same day and netted \$38.27.

Page Co., VA Will Book E., p. 50-52 records the disbursements to the heirs of John C. Aleshire decd. and the final settlement of same on 24 May 1852. The heirs separately received, thereof \$177.98 2/5; or a proper share thereof, from the executor before that date. The heirs as named at that time were Daniel Aleshire; Catherine Decious' heirs; Henry P. Aleshire; Eliz. Hollingsworth; and Peggy Mauck's heirs.

The heirs of Peggy Mauck were listed in Page Co., VA Will Book F, p. 162, 163 as (my abstract):

Benjamin F. Mauck, last payment 16 Feb. 1855.

Susan Mauck, last payment 1 March 1855.

James H. Mauck, last payment 26 November 1852.

Isaac C. Mauck, is 21 years old in 1855, last payment 1 March 1853.

John P. Mauck, is 21 years old in 1855, last payment 10 February 1855.

Emmanuel Grove was guardian of all the children until they reached their majorities or until the accounts were settled. The dates of the last payments approximate the 21st birthdays of James, Isaac and John Mauck.

Benjamin and Susan were still under 21 at the time of the last payments in 1855.

Notes for Henry P. Aleshire:

Page Co., VA Deed Book A, p. 135 - Abstract Indenture 10 Feb 1832 between Henry P. Aleshire & Rebecca his wife & Benjamin Cave. \$25.00. Joins John Offenbacher Sen. (decd.). Sally Mauck (decd.) wife of David Mauck (decd.) as her share of William Stroop (decd.) which portion of the tract descended from Sally Mauck to Rebecca Mauck now the wife of Henry P. Aleshire. Recorded 28 Mar 1832.

J McKee note: The circumstantial evidence is very good that Esther B. (Aleshire) Tutweiler is Henry and Priscilla's only daughter. The 1884 History of Cumberland Co., IL states that Thomas C. Tutweiler married Esther B. Aleshire in Fairfield Co., OH in July 1835. A marriage record that confirms this is in the

Fairfield Co. marriage register for that date. Henry P. Aleshire and family are the only Aleshire family that can be proved to be in Fairfield Co. at that time. Henry and Rebecca Aleshire were next door neighbors or nearly to Thomas and Esther Tutweiler, in Cumberland Co. IL for many years after 1850 - in so far as this can be deduced from the census records. I would imagine Esther B. is in

honor of Esther Burner, Priscilla Burner's only sister. Henry Aleshire's census records are consistent with his having a daughter born in 1817 as Esther Tutweiler is said to be on her tombstone in Cumberland Co. I believe Jacob Tutwiler to be Thomas C. Tutweiler's father. The 1884 History of Cumberland Co., IL has a biographical sketch of Thomas and family, which is consistent with this time and place. Jacob is the only Tutwiler I could find in Fairfield Co. and was a neighbor of Henry Aleshire - sections 24 and 13 are adjoining.]

Daniel Mock of Fulton Co., PA

Written to Steve Lapp:

I believe I have made a connection to Rinehart Mock b.13 April 1761. I pulled a message up from you on the Mock Archives from July 1997 under the heading Jacob Mock, War of 1812. In it you indicate you have records from Chester County PA of a John Mock with children Reinhart, Isaac, Rosina, Elizabeth, and Peter. You mention a will (John Mack/Mock "Abstract of Wills and Administrations" Chester Co. PA p. 87 #5144 names daughter Rosina and leaves her two books that was (sic) left from her mother. Also names son Rinehart, daughter Elizabeth and son Isaac. Son Peter gets real and personal estate and wife Mary is named. Mary must be a second wife) and baptismal records from Zion's Church, Spring City PA. You indicate Rinehart born 13 April 1761, and son Isaac b. 18 July 1770. with wife Anna Margaretha.

I have been trying for years to find my Mock connection in Fulton County PA and thanks to your message and some research recently in Fulton County, I believe I can connect Rinehart Mock with my Daniel Mock of Fulton/Bedford County.

Rinehart Mock/(wife Elizabeth) was a property owner in Washington County MD in 1792 and sold it in 1797. He is on the tax rolls in 1790 in Washington Co. MD. In 1792 and 1795 he purchased property in Bedford County and stays on the census/tax rolls in Bedford/Fulton county until his death in 1824. Rinehart sold his lot in Hagerstown MD and wife Elizabeth signed the deed with him so he must have married between 1795 and 1796. First son Daniel is born in 1797.

Names of Daniel, John and David appear on letters of administration and inventories of his estate (1824). This is my only proof that Daniel was his son but I think it fits.

His wife Elizabeth b. ca 1784 (not sure of this date) d. 1844 is buried with him in Fulton County on the Clark McGovern Farm just outside McConnellsburg PA, although their tombstones are incorrect or else there was a typo on the Cemetery record I copied..

Rinehart lists his age in an 1814 tax list as being 53 and that makes him born in 1761 and probably the same of Chester County PA born 1761. The property later owned by brothers John and Daniel Mock is the same which Rinehart purchased. This is land is located just outside McConnellsburg on route 522 Northin Air / Todd Township.

Daniel Mock, son of Rinehart, b. 1797 d. 1879 married Margaret Bell (first husband David Skelly) b.1815 d. 1903. Their children were George W. b. ca 1850, Daniel B. .b. 1 July 1855, James b. ca 1856, and David A.(he may be David Skelly, a child of Margaret Bell Mock's by her first husband David Skelly).

John Mock, son of Rinehart, b. 16 Aug. 1800 d. 17 March 1866 married Catharine (may be Slates) and had children Daniel, Elizabeth N. Catharine and John.

My line comes down from Daniel Bell Mock, son of Daniel Mock, son of Rinehart Mock. Daniel Bell Mock m. first Agnes Bowman and had children Elsie May, Sarah Margaret, Will, Charles and Harry C. He later married his neice, Florence Bowman and had children Charles, James, Scott William, Effie, Alice L., May O. Maude O, Mary M., Murnie S. and Roy A.

Also, Peter Mock (you mention him as a brother to Rinehart) also owned land in Washington County MD in 1793. In 1798 Rinehart is taxed in Bedford Co. as #55 with a one-story log house and Peter Mock is #56 with a two story log house. Apparently Peter is still a landholder in Chester Co. PA through 1820. Does he have land in two places and are they the same Peter? In 1800 Peter Mock and Rinehart assess in Air / Ayr Township Bedford Co. PA.

Steve Lapp's memo written 17 Jul 1997 to Gene Andert who was researching a Jacob Mock b. ca1793; d. 4 Jan 1872; m. 1813 in Chester Co., PA, Catherine Poley b. 7 Dec 1789; d. bef 4 Dec 1877. Jacob's 1812 Pension Record states that he resided in Chester Co., PA 3 Mar 1855 and in Palmer Twp., Northampton, PA 25 Mar 1871. In 1872, Catherine, Jacob's widow, was living in Glendon Borough, Northampton, PA.

Steve states, "I believe Jacob Mock may descend from an old Chester Co., PA family in St. Vincent Township. Several years ago I found records for this family in Salt Lake City in a 1946 book called *History of Zion's or Old Organ Church, with a Record of Baptisms and Biographical Sketches of Former Pastors, Founded by Muhelbuerg in 1743*, by Rev. Charles F. Dapp, Pastor of Zion's Church

In brief, the records reveal a John Mack/Mock married to Anna Margaretha with sons Reinhart b. 13 Apr 1761 and Isaac b. 18 Jul 1770. From a later will I located for John, daughters Rosina, Elizabeth and son, Peter. "Mary" was wife's name in the will.

Reinhart Mock and Peter Mock may be the same named who lived in Maryland in 1790 and Peter may be the one who moved to Bedford Co, PA abt. 1804-1810. This is much speculation on my part.

I have census indexes for Chester Co. Macks and Mocks and there were several Jacob Mocks in St. Vincent Township prior to 1850.

I believe these Chester Co. Mocks have not been studied, at least by any of us MFH members.

Family Traditions - Fact or Fiction

J. Douglas Mauck

I was born at the end of the Great Depression, just before WWII. As I grew up, I heard family stories about the history of the Mauck family. I was told that I was of German descent that changed to "Pennsylvania Dutch" during WWI and WW II. My interests were aroused, so in my 40's I started researching my family. The research began to unravel some of the family stories.

In the first place, I discovered that if the Maucks (Maags) were German at all, the German blood had been overwhelmed in the last 250 years by Scots genetics with a little English thrown in from time to time. This began with my earliest ancestor, Daniel Mauck b. ca 1740 in Page Co. VA, who married Rebecca Baker. His son, Joseph Mauck married Elizabeth Whaley, also English. Joseph's son, John b. ca. 1804 OH, married Mary Knapp (German!). Their son David b. 1826 married Matilda Phelps of Ulster Scot lineage. David's son Bartlett b. 1850 MO, married Mary Amanda Kennedy, another Ulster Scot. Mary and Bartlett's son, David married Sarah Harper, another Ulster Scot. Their son, my father David Harper Mauck b. 1910, married Nellie Kennedy, who is descended from Ulster Scots on both sides of her family. Even with all of the dilution of the German blood, which may have been Swiss anyway, I was told that my Maucks spoke German until the 1930's in MO! At least 250 years after the unknown Swiss/German Mauck landed in the colonies.

I was told about a great-great uncle, Matthew Mauck, who was said to have been a Major in the Union Army and had shook hands with Abe Lincoln on a battlefield. He lost his right ring finger in a sabre fight with a Confederate officer on horseback. (WRONG!) Research reveals that he was a private who joined the 21st MO Volunteer Infantry at age 15. He had thrown a pitchfork at a neighbor's cow and the cow carried the pitchfork home in her ribs. Knowing he was in trouble, Matt joined the army to escape judgement and wrath. After the war, as a garrison private in Alabama, Matt got drunk on guard duty, got in a fight and deserted at age 18. Some Major! It's research that interlinks into history that keeps me looking.

I have recently found your excellent material on Mock/Mauck family which has many cross-connections to my Beaver ancestors. I would like to know if you have any death/burial information on Henry Mauck (1.2.b on working chart). Your record shows he married (2nd) Mary Beaver-Kneisley who was b. abt. 1738 and d. aft. 1792.

I am wondering if this is perhaps Mary Kneisley who married (1st) Conrad Beaver. I have never found a death date/burial place for Mary and now I wonder if she could be buried near Henry Mauck.

In some addition notes, I have the following variant information:

1.2.1 Catherine Mauck m. Isaac Strickler who was b. abt 1729 Lancaster, PA; d. 1 May 1817 Shenandoah, VA. Catherine's son John, by her 1st marriage to Christian Beaver, married Isaac's daughter Nancy!

1.2.2 Abraham Mauck. I show his first wife, Mary Beaver b. 1 Nov 1771 in Shenandoah Co, VA; d. 16 Aug 1819. I have their marriage date as 1789 in one source, 1798 in another.

1.2.a.2 Susannah Mauck. I show her husband Michael Beaver's death date as 30 Jul 1822. I believe Michael married Susan/Susannah first and her sister Magdalene/Molly second.

Book on Bourbon Co, KY Near Completion

The research phase of *Early Families of Bourbon Co. Kentucky 1775-1820* is now complete. I set the date of June 30, 2000 as the final deadline for data received from fellow researchers, and will now begin the difficult task of inputting all of the data into my computer. I figure this task will take about three months. Once I complete the inputting phase of the project, I will begin writing the book(s).

I want to thank all who so generously opened your research to me and who sent the many volumes of information. Just to let you know how much has stacked up over the past several months, I now have five large three-ring binders filled with data plus literally hundreds of pages of data scanned from the John Fox, Jr., library in Paris, Kentucky (I spent 18 hours while in Bourbon County at the end of June scanning text!).

Add to this about 50 huge word processing documents sitting in a folder on my computer, and you can imagine the massive amount of information remaining to be processed.

The end result of all of this research should be the most complete and comprehensive treatment of the history and genealogy of the early families of Bourbon County, Kentucky, ever attempted. Though I do not have exact number, I estimate that the book (or books), once completed, will list in excess of 40,000 names. This will include descendants of these early families from the earliest period to the present day. It will be the first attempt ever to bring together all of the families and show the complex interrelationships that emerged from the intermarriages over the course of the past two hundred plus years.

As I draw near to the completion of this project, I will begin to compile a list of folks interested in purchasing the books. I will create a web page providing the full details, including cost, number and size of the books, etc. Those who wish to visit the site may do so.

As I input the data I will, of course, continue to update the material posted for downloading on my "Early Families of Bourbon County, Kentucky, web site.
