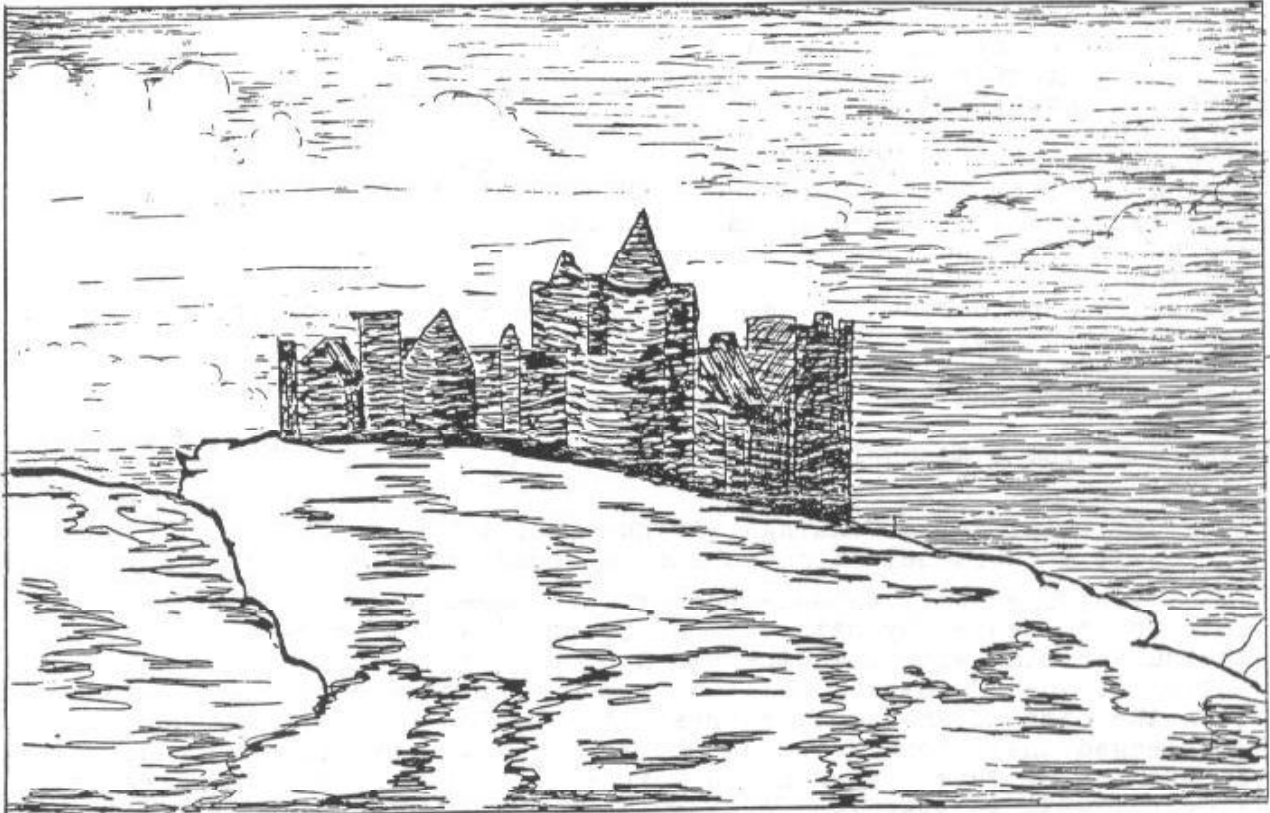

B. JOHN CARMACK, Born Ca. 1720, Died 1810/12. Son of: Cornelius 1681
Will prob. May 19, 1812 & Gwin.

In the name of God amen.

I, John Carmack of the County of Washington in the State of Va., being of sound and disposing mind and memory and calling to mind the uncertainty of life do make this my last Will and Testament in manner and form as followeth and first of all I will and direct that all my just debts be paid out of my moveable Estate and then my wife is to have the Benets of my plantation, house and furniture during her natural life and then it is to be divided between my son William and my grandson James son of my daughter Nelly I raised and lived with me from a child that is to say one hundred acres to James to be taken of the upper end of the land and to run a straight line across and all the remainder after my wife's decease I give and bequeath to my son William and his heirs forever and all my moveable after my wife's decease I give and bequeath to my son's John and William and to my daughters Kelly Gray and Polly Warfield to be equally divided among them. I also give and bequeath to my wife the use and labor of my negro fellow Will during her life and at her decease I give and bequeath the said negro Will to my son William and his heirs forever, and that these devises may be properly understood my wife is to have the whold during her life, and then it is to be divided as above expressed, and I do appoint my two son's John Carmack and William Carmack Executors of this last Will and Testament hereby revoking all other Wills and Testaments by me heretofore made declaring this to be my only last Will and Testament.-Given under my hand and seal this 27th day of August, 1810.

Signed sealed & acknowledged in presence John ^{his} Mark Carmack (Seal)
of us.

John Campbell, James Cummings, Arthur Campbell.

At a Court held for Washington County the 19th day of May, 1812.

The last Will & testament of John Carmack, decd. was exhibited into Court, proven by oath of John Campbell & Arthur Campbell two of the subscribing witnesses thereto & ordered to be recorded. And on the motion of John Carmack & William Carmack the executors therein named who took the oath of an executor prescribed by Law & entered into and acknowledged their bond with Hugh McChesney & Andrew Willoughby securities in the sum of Three Thousand dollars conditioned as the law directs.-- A Certificate is therefore granted them for the probat of the said Will in due form.

J. S. Carmack, farmer, was born in Washington County, Va., August 8, 1830, the son
of Cornelius and Martha (Susong) Carmack, the former born at the above place in Jan-
uary, 1800, the son of William, a Pennsylvanian. The next ancestor, John, came from
England to Pennsylvania, and was the ancestor of all of this name west of the Potomac.
Several of his sons served in the Revolution. He entered 600 acres of land, most of
which is still owned by the family, and which was on disputed territory between Virginia
and Tennessee, so that the Legislatures of those commonwealths had to compromise on
the question of taxes. He settled his children on large tracts of land in Hawkins County,
and returned to Washington County, Va., where he died. William died in the same
county, leaving ten children, of whom Cornelius was a second. The mother was born in
Virginia in 1805, the daughter of Jacob and Margaret (Baggs) Susong, he a magistrate of
his county, and deceased June 17, 1877. The grandfather was a major on Gen. Washing-
ton's staff, and was a native of France, born of a German mother. Martha died July 2,
1887. Both parents were Presbyterians. Our subject, the fourth of ten children, was
educated in Washington County, Va., and at Paperville. In 1861 he joined Company C,
Forty-eighth Virginia Confederate Infantry and became second lieutenant, and a few months
later became commander of two companies, until his health failed him in 1861. In 1862 he
was commissioned captain in the quartermaster's department, but in September his health
failed him, and he returned home. He made another attempt to enter service, but was
rejected on account of his health. In February, 1863, he was relieved from field duty,
and in March was placed on post duty in Tennessee and Georgia. Since the war he has
been a farmer, and now owns 1,000 acres of land in this and Washington (Va.) Counties.
In December, 1871, he married Jane, the daughter of Philip and Mary Bushong, and
born June 23, 1863. Their children were Martha E., Robert P. and an infant deceased. Our
subject and wife are Presbyterians.

Woman served hash when Harry came to eat

The recent death of Bess Truman, "The Boss" of Harry S. Truman's White House, brought back fond memories for Frances Fields.

"They were lovely people," said Mrs. Fields, a retired school teacher who was reared at Sarcoxie, lived in both Springfield and Lebanon, and taught elementary school 22 years at Kansas City.

"They never made you feel that they were better than you. Never. They were down to earth. Everybody liked them," said Mrs. Fields, who has made her home in Springfield since 1973.

One incident Mrs. Fields likes to recall occurred during Truman's first campaign for the U.S. Senate in the 1930s.

"I met Harry when my husband (the late Robert Fields, Sr., who died in 1953) was chairman of the Laclede County Democratic committee. He was a Lebanon lawyer and a committeeman for Laclede County," Mrs. Fields said.

"Harry was down politicking," she said. "I had cleaned up my refrigerator and made hash, if you can imagine.

"Somebody got sick or somebody died at the only restaurant in town, so my husband called at 10 till 12 . . . to put another plate at the table. He was bringing a gentleman."

Of course, Mrs. Fields had never met the guest, and she had already set the table.

"So I ran in the dining room, fixed another tossed salad and toast, and when they arrived in 10 minutes I had it ready.

"I was so embarrassed by the hash I couldn't talk about it."

But down-to-earth Harry S. Truman ate every bite, she said, and "he told me that was the best hash he ever ate."

Most guests would respond the same way, but Mrs. Fields

had a postscript. The story takes place in Washington, D.C.

"Mr. Fields and a lawyer from Kansas City, who had been a lieutenant under Harry, would go to Washington in those days when income tax deals were so big."

In fact, she said, her husband and the Kansas City lawyer made trips to Washington every three or four months. Sometimes, they participated in the president's famous poker games, where \$5 was the limit.

"When they lost that \$5 they were out of the game," Mrs. Fields said.

"One time we were there, Mr. Fields and I, and we had already checked out of the hotel and had our car ready to go.

"Mr. Fields said, 'I have to call Harry and say hello.'"

"Harry said, 'Is your wife with you? Come eat lunch with us.'"

"'Oh, we're ready to go, on our way home,' my husband said.

"He (Truman) just said, 'The White House limousine will be there in 15 minutes.'"

Mrs. Fields said the offer couldn't be refused.

"Wouldn't you call that a command?" she asked. "So we went out dressed to travel instead of dressed for lunch at the White House.

The White House meal was nice, she said, but before they left, Mrs. Truman told her:

"Now Mrs. Fields, Harry has told me to ask you how to make hash. He won't eat mine."

"I told her, 'My face is red about that.'"

"He said it was wonderful," Mrs. Truman responded.

"I just used some bouillon cubes and cleaned out the refrigerator. That's the only difference I can tell," Mrs. Fields recalled.

Mrs. Fields later visited with Mrs. Truman perhaps a dozen times over the years.

Was she the gracious lady she appeared to be?

"I never saw her when she wasn't," Mrs. Fields said.

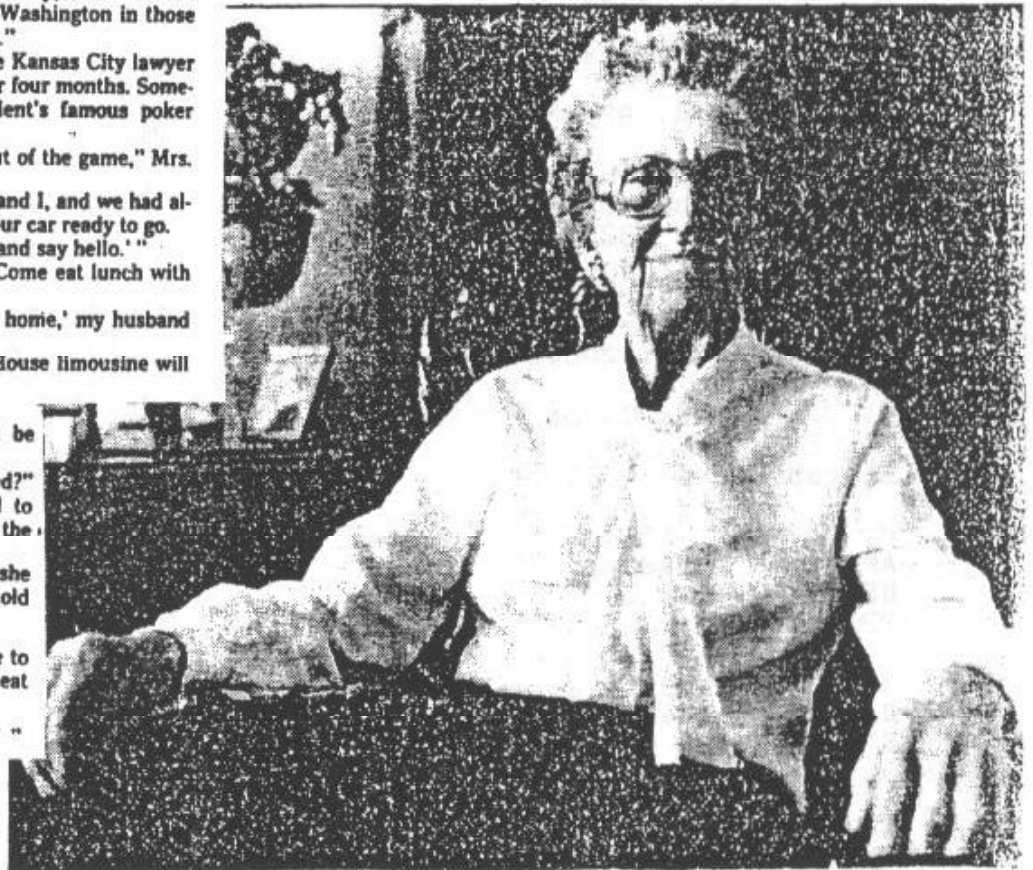

Sue Thompson's trip to England & Ireland:

Cashel was in medieval days the hub of civil and ecclesiastical life in Munster and is now a busy town of 3,000 people. Rising majestically over the town, the famous Rock of Cashel is crowned with a magnificent group of ruins sitting on a 200' hill. Legend states the devil spat for this limestone outcrop from his Devil's Bit Mountains, where a gap corresponds to its dimensions. The original cross remains on the pedestal where St. Patrick crowned the reigning king in A. D. 450. In 1101, King Murtagh O'Brien granted the rock to the Church. In 1127, Cormack McCarthy, King of Desmond, began to build the little Hiberno-Romanesque church known as "Cormacs Chapel" which is also styled a "miniature cathedral". It was consecrated with great pomp and ceremony in 1134 - having distinct Irish features, particularly the stone roof. A cathedral was begun beside this in 1169, and here two years later the assembled clergy of Ireland did homage first to Strongbow and then Henry II himself. This cathedral was later pulled down to make way for the building whose shell now dominates the rock. This great church, the building of which commenced in the 13th century, remained in use until the mid-18th century.

The Deanery (now the Cashel Place Hotel) was formerly the palace of the Protestant archbishops. Built in the Queen Anne style in 1730, it is a beautiful specimen of 18th-century domestic architecture and has a magnificent lounge hall with the original panelling and carving, and a spacious Adam dining room. They have beautiful gardens from the back through which you can stroll a very short distance to the rock.

My sister and I loved this part of our trip - to stay in a beautifully restored palace and the staff was lovely to us. I do suggest that if you can go, be sure to make reservations early as they only have a few rooms. We were so impressed the hotel, and can promise you an awesome sight as you come into town and see the "Rock of Cashel".
