On August 17, 1896, one of the most startling and far reaching discoveries in history took place the cry was heard clear cross the continent, "One hundred dollars to the pan!"

This discovery poured into the exchequer of the Canadian Government such a huge sum of royalties for the gold taken out that it added materially to the prosperity of that country. It also built large cities, established lines of transportation and traffic opened the gates of the Northern Empire and peopled the vast and lonely; land with a study, energetic, preservering population.

After traveling over ridges and over mountains and going a couple of miles further down the creek I began to get a little gold. Then I became more careful in prospecting, following around each bend of the creek looking for bed-rock.

After half a mile below the fork of the creek thaw we had followed up before, as we were walking along a high bank of the right "limit," where the creek made a sharp bend to the right, we ran hard up against the hill. I was ahead (George Washington) about fifty feet up from the water's edge. I stopped and looked down the bank and there I saw a long narrow strip of bed-rock, about a hundredfeet long and from ten to twelve feet wide. Now here was the very thing we were looking for! Waiting until my two companions caught up to me, I pointed down to the strip of bed-rock and said, "Look down there, boys, If this creek is good for anything at all, we sure ought to find gold down there."

Throwing off my packs, I walked down to the rim, and as soon as I reached it I stopped and looked down. My heart skipped a beat. After rubbing my eyes with the back of my hand to wipe away a misty film that enveloped the pupils, I reached down and picked up a nugget about the size of a dime. I put it between my teeth and bit at it like a newsboy who had found a quarter in the street. Looking up at my two companion who had discarded their packs and were sitting on the bank watching me, I held up the nugget between my thumb and forefinger and shouted, "Hi yu gold! bring down the pan and the shovel. Hi yak."

As it was getting late and we were tired and hungry. For five days we had been traveling over niggerheads and dry muskegs, forcing our way through thick tangles of devil club, stunted birch and spruce thickets, getting very little rest of sleep.

After roasting some of our bear meat and making a pot of tea, we ate our supper. Then we sat around the fire and smoked our pipes. After the pipes were out the two Indians, sitting with their blankets over their shoulders, their lean, bronze feathers lit up by the bright, gleaming camp fire, began to chant a wind, weird song of praise to the Great Spirit.

They sang of the many journeys we had made together, over silent lakes and rivers, of the burning summer and freezing winter, the silent trails, the hunting of the moose and caribou, of our feasts and famines, and even of the weird shadows of the tall spruce trees around our camp fire, ending with a loud, gladsome burst of our GREAT DISCOVERY. Then they rolled themselves in their blankets and were soon playing the tired man's duet.

In all that eleven years of strenuous, unceasing battle with the unsubdued Northland, I had imbibed a grim optimism, which found expression in undertaking to accomplish things which seemed at the time almost impossible of achievement. At last my hopes were about to be realized.

I was getting sleepy, so I rolled into my blanket and lay looking at the scintillating stars, gleaming in the great arching dome of the unclouded Yukon sky. a falling meteor flashed for an instant across the heavens, then disappeared, and then I fell into a dreamless sleep.

At the break of day we were up, eating our meager breakfast, and washed it down with a cup of coffee, without sugar or milk. Then, taking my hand ax, I went out into the center of the flat to a small spruce tree and blazed it on the up and down stream sides. With a pencil, I wrote on the up-stream side, this notice:

"TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN;

"I do, this day, locate and claim, by right of discovery, five hundred feet, running up stream form this notice, Located this 17th. day of August, 1896." "G. W. Carmack"

Then taking a fifty-foot tape line, which I had in my pack, we measured off five hundred feet up stream, as a discovery claim, then five hundred feet more, as one about discovery, for Jim. Then going back, I measured off five hundred feet for myself by right of location, then five hundred feet as two below discovery for Charley. Then going back to a tall birch tree, standing on the bank near the point of discovery, I cut off a section of bark and wrote on it these words: "I name this creek 'Bonanza." "George Carmack." I fastened it to the discovery stake and left the pan and shovel beside it. We then shouldered our packs and mushed for the Klondike.


Carmack, W. T., born 1923, died 17 March 1989, Dyersburg, Tn., burial at Halls Cemetery.
