#### Shakespeare (one day per week)

If your student has not studied Shakespeare previously, consider reading through *Tales from Shakespeare* by Charles and Mary Lamb. If you have already read through this book, then choose any plays listed on the *Ambleside Online* Shakespeare page (see http://www.amblesideonline.org/ShakespeareSch.shtml) to read using *No Fear Shakespeare* (see http://nfs.sparknotes.com/)
