

World History II - Medieval, Renaissance/Reformation

Part One includes the rise and fall of the Roman Empire, the middle ages in Europe, the rise of Islam and the Crusades, the age of exploration, and the establishment of trade with the Far East. The study concludes with the discoveries of Columbus and the Spanish settlements in the New World.

Part Two includes the reformation in Germany, the Netherlands, France, and England, the settlement of colonies in America, the rise of England and the Netherlands as sea powers, and the corresponding fall of Spain.
