Declaration

In order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress
of the 7th July 1832

State of North Carolina County of common Pleas
Montgomery County, and quarter before
October term 1832 On this the 1st day of October 1832
Personally appears in open court before the Justice of
said court now in Superior Joseph Parsons a resident
of the County of Montgomery in the State of North Carolina
aged twenty one years who being first duly sworn
according to law doth on his oath make the following
declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act
of Congress, dated June 7 1832

That he entered the military service of the United
States in the year 1776 and served two months under
Capt. William Robertson in an expedition against
the Cherokee Indians in the Regiment commanded by
Col. David Rose of Marion County N.C. that he was then
16 years old and that he was duly discharged & returned home

He further states that in the year 1780 in June he
again entered into the service as a volunteer under
Capt. Sam'l Green of Montgomery and after serving
and marchinging in the adjoining counties against
the Tories some time he joined Gates' army and was
in the Battle of Camden on the 16th August 1780 and when
the Army was dispersed he returned home after having
served four months and a half.

He further states that about the last of July or the
first of August 1781 he volunteered and served as a
Lieutenant in the Militia under Capt. Shadrach Hogan
of Montgomery and was chiefly employed in collecting and
driving beef cattle to the Reg't, commanded by Genl
Washington near Circular on the See in which town
he served five weeks and returned home.

He further states that he was commissioned
a Captain by Genl Thomas Madsen with instructions to
raise thirty French soldiers to serve as horsemen
for the term of three months that his commission is
lost or misplaced that he served as a Captain during
said three months in guarding and defending the Country
against the Tories that he was in an engagement
with the Tories on Little River Montgomery & returned home

Sometime in the year 1781

He further states that he was ordered by Genl. [unclear] to collect what Troops he could and join them which he did and marched with them to Bell's Ridge in Dranes
ing Creek & C^t which ~~he~~ ^{on the summer of 1782} started and had a battle with
the British and Tories and served two weeks in his
town. He further states that he volunteered under
Capt. Packard as a private ^{in the summer of 1782} Packard being under Col. Eggleston
and that he served three weeks in reconnoitring in the
counties of Randolph, Roanoke and Monroe.

He further states that he joined Col. John Joseph
in August in 1782 and went to Bailey's Ferry on the Roanoke
and about one month he was sent with him to Dranes
ing Creek and then in the service two weeks and was taken sick and
returned home. He further states that a few weeks
after he volunteered in the service under Capt. John
Joseph of Roanoke & C^t Roanoke and was employed on
reconnoitring the counties of Montgomery & Roanoke and
had a fight with the Tories in Montgomery and served
in this town three weeks. He further states he was
appointed by Genl. Rutherford ^{in 1782} to raise the militia in the
county of Montgomery and to guard and protect the said
county & surrounding country and served some time but
doubtless less than one month twelve months
but before the beginning of the second eleven months
say three months as Captain in about nine months as a private
~~as he~~ ^{as he} ~~had~~ ^{had} no account but that of no person whose
testimony he can procure who can testify to his service
except George Green and Joseph Jackson who can testify
to a part of said service ^{and whose testimony is herewith} ^{Documentary or}
enclosed and that he has no other evidence than is herein with
sent. He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a
Pension or annuity except the present and declares that his
name is not on the Pension Roll of the agency of any state

On this the 4 day of July 1839.

Personally appears before Nancy Parsons, a resident
of the county aforesaid in the said county of Mont-
gomery aged about forty five years who being first
duly sworn according to law doth on her oath make
the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit
of the provision made by the act of Congress passed July
7th 1838 entitled an Act granting half pay and pensions
to certain widows That she is the widow of ~~late a Prisoner~~
Joseph Parsons, who was a private and a captain
of militia in the Revolutionary war as will appear
by his Declaration and papers on file in the office of
the Commissioner of Pensions in the City of Washington
She further declares that she was married to the said
Joseph Parsons sometime in the summer of the year
1790 or 1791 but which of those years she cannot speak with
certainty, nor can she specify the month nor day of the month
on which she was married precisely That her husband
the aforesaid Joseph Parsons died on the 28th day of November
1837, 1837 That she was not married to him prior to his
leaving the service but the marriage took place pre-
vious to the first of January seventeen hundred and
and ninety four viz about the time above specified

Know all men by these presents that we
Joseph Parsons and George Taylor both of
Montgomery county and State of North Carolina
are here and firmly bound to Alexander
Martin Esqr. Governor &c and his successors
in office in the full and just sum of
One Thousand pounds current money of
said State to the which payment well
and truly to be made we bind ourselves
our heirs executors and administrators
jointly and severally firmly by these
presents sealed with our seals and
dated this 12th February 1790.

The condition of the above obligation is
such that whereas the above bound
Joseph Parsons hath the day the date
hereof applied for and obtained a
license to celebrate the rites of matrimony
between himself and Nancy Jordan now
if there be no just cause to obstruct
the marriage for which the license
was granted for them the above
obligation to be void or else remain
in full force and virtue.

Dear Madam:

I advise you from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim, W. 4047, it appears that Joseph Parsons was born in Anson County, North Carolina, in 1780.

While living in Montgomery (formerly a part of Anson) County, North Carolina, he enlisted and served in the North Carolina Troops as follows:

In 1776, two months as private in Captain Cornelius Robinson's Company, Colonel David Love's Regiment.

From June 1780, two and one half months in Captain James Crump's Company, was in the battle of Camden.

From July or August 1781, five weeks as Lieutenant in Captain Shadrack Hogan's Company.

From October 1781, three months as Captain under General Wade, was in an engagement with the Tories on the "Little River Montgomery".

In 1781, two weeks under General Wade, was in a battle at Betty's Bridge on Drowning Creek.

In the summer of 1782, three weeks as private in Captain Raiford's Company, Colonel Lytle's Regiment.

In August 1782, two weeks as private under Major Douglass.

In 1782, three weeks as private in Captain John Lopp's Company.

In 1782, one month on guard duty under General Rutherford.

He was allowed pension on his application executed October 1, 1832, while residing in Montgomery County, North Carolina.

He died November 28, 1837.

He married in the summer of 1790 or 1791, Nancy Jordon. She was allowed pension on her application executed July 4, 1839, while residing in Montgomery County, North Carolina, aged sixty-five years.

In 1851 it was stated that the widow was dead and had left several children who were all of age and married, no names stated. One daughter married James Bruton.

The Revolutionary War records of this Bureau fail to afford any information in regard to Thomas, Robert or George Mendenhall.
